REGULAR AGENDA

DISCUSSION: Matter of a receiving a presentation regarding the MiLife consortium.

City Manager VanVleck opened the Work Session with an introduction of the MiLife consortium.

City Manager VanVleck introduced the presenters for the evening:

- City of Madison Heights Manager Melissa Marsh
- Manquen Vance Founder Mark Manquen
- Marathon Health Senior Vice President JP Miller

City Manager VanVleck said Berkley has been in discussions with the current MiLife consortium. She said the cities of Madison Heights, Royal Oak, Hazel Park, Ferndale, and Oak Park invited Berkley to participate. She said she is in the process of finalizing costs. She said participation in a direct contract clinic like this allows the City an opportunity to better control our healthcare costs long term.

City Manager Marsh provided her perspective on why utilizing the MiLife consortium is advantageous for a community, including the overall cost savings and soft benefits provided to employees and the city's budget. Madison Heights is a founding member and began participation in the Clinic in 2012. She said she has a reputation for being fiscally responsible and would not recommend joining the consortium if it were not a benefit and cost-savings for Madison Heights.

City Manager Marsh provided examples of the cost of health services provided by BC/BS versus what the MiLife clinic charges the city for the same services when employees utilize it for health care. She stated that clinic utilization is about 66 percent in Madison Heights. She said along with the cost savings it provides to the city, it also provides preventative health care to employees to prevent larger health events from happening.

City Manager VanVleck discussed the City of Oak Park's participation and concurred with the positive experience.

City Manager VanVleck explained the City of Berkley is a self-pay community for health insurance, along with asking employees to pay some of the costs. She stated there aren't a lot of ways to cut health care costs. She said joining the consortium is one way.

Mr. Miller explained all of the services the MiLife clinic provides and went into greater detail on the healthcare model. He said the Clinic takes a value-based approach to health care, where larger institutions are bottom-line based.

Mr. Miller explained the difference in care includes:

Traditional Fee-for-Service Healthcare:

- Low-quality outcomes
- Overuse of high-priced specialists, Rx, and diagnostics
- Ever-increasing health spending
- Bad experience for plan sponsors, providers, and patients

Advanced Primary Care from Marathon Health:

- Improved health outcomes
- Less reliance on medications and specialists
- Reduced health spending
- Great experience for plan sponsors, providers, and patients

What Advanced Primary Care Offers:

- Structural Change
 - o Paid for value vs. fee-for-service
 - On hook for health of population
 - o Outcomes driven by continuous data and relationships
- A New Model for Care
 - Easy destination for 90 percent of health needs
 - Proactive and positive pathway to better, earlier help
 - The clinician's original draw to medicine made real
- The Sponsor and Consumer Win
 - o More access, more convenient
 - o A personal experience and relationship
 - Less pocketbook pain
- By the Numbers
 - 33 percent lower cost
 - 19 percent lower odds of dying prematurely
 - \$13 in savings for every \$1 spent
 - \$67 billion savings each year
 - o 90 percent of medical needs can be met in our health centers

Services Provided include:

The year one total estimated health center cost is \$88,803 with an estimated monthly flat rate of \$7,400. The clinic is located inside Madison Heights City Hall.

Councilmember Vilani, utilizing her expertise as a health care provider executive, asked questions and discussed the consortium with the presenters.

City Manager VanVleck said it would take a majority vote by the Council to participate in the MiLife consortium and would take about 150 days to implement.

Councilmember Baker asked if mental health care is provided through the clinic.

Mr. Miller said the clinic would provide screenings and has a program called Live Better. He stated that patients would have access to staff psychologists and therapists. He said the virtual offering is highly utilized. He stated that each entity can opt into a virtual mental health program, and more complex cases would be given a referral.

Councilmember Patterson asked about pre-diagnosis and/or pre-screenings. He asked if partnering municipalities have seen a decrease in catastrophic costs.

A discussion took place regarding what stats are maintained by partnering communities.

Director Stover said the clinic would be available to covered employees and their dependents.

City Manager Marsh said it is a low-cost way to attract part-time help when the benefit is also offered to part-time staff.

City Manager VanVleck said the City is looking at spending \$1.7 million in health care costs if the Council approves employees paying for health care. She stated that participating in the consortium and providing health care through the MiLife Clinic is one of the few ways to cut those costs.

Background

- The Berkley Department of Public Safety provides Lockup Services, Animal Control Services, the use of the BDPS range, and Dispatch Services for the City of Huntington Woods.
- The current intergovernmental agreement is expired
- This agreement continues to be mutually beneficial and both departments wish to continue this arrangement

Summary

- Other than the dates of the agreement, there are no other changes
- The City of Berkley will provide these Services for the City of Huntington Woods for a \$6,500 fixed yearly fee for each full-time equivalent (FTE) reflected in the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards (MCOLES) Fall Semi-Annual Law Enforcement Distribution Report for the Huntington Woods Department of Public Safety.
- The FTE for HWDPS for the fall, 2024 is 17, resulting in a \$110,500 fee for the FY 25/26 budget year

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES BETWEEN THE CITY OF HUNTINGTON WOODS AND THE CITY OF BERKLEY

The City of Huntington Woods, Michigan ("Huntington Woods"), a Michigan Municipal Corporation with offices at 26815 Scotia, Huntington Woods, Michigan 48070, and the City of Berkley, Michigan, ("Berkley"), a Michigan Municipal Corporation with offices at 3338 Coolidge Highway, Berkley, Michigan 48072, hereby enter into the following agreement:

RECITALS:

A. Huntington Woods has concluded that it would be beneficial to contract for certain law enforcement services with Berkley.

B. Berkley agrees to provide such law enforcement services under the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

C. This Agreement is consistent with the charters of Berkley and Huntington Woods, and is authorized under the Urban Cooperation Act of 1967, MCL 124.501 *et seq*, and MCL 124.531 *et seq*.

IT IS THEREFORE AGREED:

1. **Definitions**. For the purposes of this Agreement, the terms listed below shall be defined as follows:

a. "Berkley," "Berkley City Council," and "Berkley City Manager" shall mean the City of Berkley, its City Council, and its City Manager, respectively.

b. "Huntington Woods," "Huntington Woods City Council," and "Huntington Woods City Manager" shall mean Huntington Woods, its Council, and its City Manager, respectively.

c. "Lockup Services" shall mean the detention of persons awaiting processing, booking, court appearances, or transportation to a jail, for a period not to exceed seventy-two (72) hours in accordance with MCL 791.262(1)(e) and such other services as described in paragraph 2.a.

d. "Municipality" shall mean either the City of Berkley or the City of Huntington Woods, and when plural it shall mean both Berkley and Huntington Woods.

2. <u>Lockup Services</u>. The Municipalities agree that Berkley shall provide Lockup Services to Huntington Woods as follows:

a. Lockup Services shall include, but not be limited to:

(i) Detention of persons awaiting processing, booking, court appearances, or transportation to a jail, for a period not to exceed seventy-two (72) hours;

(ii) Providing meals to detainees in the lockup in accordance with Berkley Department of Public Safety Rules and Regulations;

(iii) Providing conditions of detention in accordance with Berkley Department of Public Safety Rules and Regulations;

(iv) Testifying in Court, at depositions, or any required administrative hearing;

(v) Upon request, the provision of equipment and personnel necessary for video arraignment; and

(vi) Providing other Lockup Services as agreed to by the Municipalities.

Acceptance and Searches of Detainees. In order for a subject arrested by b. Huntington Woods to be admitted to Berkley lockup, he or she first must be accepted by Berkley. When Huntington Woods desires to have a subject detained at Berkley's lockup, Huntington Woods officer(s) shall turn over to Berkley officer-in-charge (or his/her designee) all booking intake forms and other information as requested by Berkley officerin-charge (or his/her designee). Berkley officer-in-charge (or his/her designee) shall base his/her decision to accept or reject the subject on the same criteria as any other Berkley arrest and in accordance with Berkley Department of Public Safety Rules and Regulations. Huntington Woods police officer(s) transporting the subject shall conduct a thorough search of the subject in accordance with Berkley Department of Public Safety Rules and Regulations prior to turning the subject over to Berkley. Berkley may conduct its own search of the subject prior to accepting the subject for lockup. If not refused, the subject is accepted. No personal property of the subject, except clothing the subject is wearing and his/her prescription medication(s), if any, shall be left in the custody of Berkley for any reason.

c. <u>Processing of Detainees</u>. Huntington Woods officer(s) transporting a subject to Berkley for lockup shall process the subject consistent with Berkley Department of Public Safety Rules and Regulations. When available, Berkley personnel may provide assistance with prisoner processing.

(i) When a Huntington Woods prisoner is to be released (i.e. turned over to another agency, transported to county jail, or taken to another facility, etc.), a Huntington Woods officer shall respond and take responsibility for all prisoner property not transferred with the prisoner.

(ii) Berkley agrees that should an emergency arise in Huntington Woods during prisoner processing, Berkley will take reasonable steps to provide personnel to assist Huntington Woods officer(s) with the processing of its detainee(s) so that Huntington Woods officer(s) may respond to the Huntington Woods emergency.

d. <u>Refusal of Subjects</u>. Berkley reserves the right to refuse admittance to its lockup of any prisoner who is deemed unacceptable for housing in Berkley lockup for any reason in the opinion of the Berkley officer-in-charge (or his/her designee), including but

not limited to refusal of admittance to any subject suffering from mental illness or from a medical condition that threatens the security or the efficient operation of Berkley's lockup.

e. <u>Medical Services</u>. Huntington Woods agrees to pay for all costs and fees associated with the provision of medical care, transportation and treatment by Berkley emergency services personnel, any ambulance service, or any medical personnel or entity, to any detainee accepted by Berkley for Lockup Services under this Agreement for the full duration of detention. If, after acceptance of a subject for lockup in Berkley, the detainee requires medical care and/or treatment, Huntington Woods shall provide officers to guard the prisoner during the course of the detainee's medical care. To the fullest extent permitted by law, and to the extent of the cost of medical care provided to a detainee, Huntington Woods hereby agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Berkley for any and all claims, demands, lawsuits, or causes of action brought by any person, corporation, or government unit against Berkley, its agents, elected or appointed officials, and employees arising from or in connection with the medical care and treatment of detainees housed in Berkley's lockup pursuant to this Agreement.

f. <u>*Transportation*</u>. Huntington Woods shall be responsible for transporting its detainees both to and from Berkley's lockup to court, county jail, or other agencies or facilities as required.

g. <u>Blood Draws for OWI Arrests</u>. Huntington Woods prisoners arrested for OWI or similar charges, and requiring a blood draw, shall be subject to Berkley Department of Public Safety Rules and Regulations for this process. Huntington Woods agrees to pay for all services related to blood draws for detainees housed in Berkley lockup under this Agreement.

h. <u>Bond</u>. Huntington Woods agrees to process bond for all Huntington Woods detainees housed in Berkley lockup under this Agreement. Persons wishing to post bond for Huntington Woods prisoners shall be directed to contact Huntington Woods and make arrangements for Huntington Woods officers to process the bond. Proof of bond shall be presented prior to the release of a Huntington Woods prisoner.

i. <u>Use of Technology</u>. When practical, and so as not to interfere with the security or the efficient operation of Berkley's lockup, Huntington Woods shall be allowed to utilize available technology located at Berkley lockup for video arraignments or other court appearances of its detainees under this Agreement.

j. <u>Administrative Responsibility</u>. Berkley's provision of Lockup Services to Huntington Woods shall be administered by Berkley as follows:

(i) <u>Control of Lockup Services</u>. The Lockup Services performed by Berkley shall be under the exclusive jurisdiction and control of Berkley's Director of Public Safety. All Huntington Woods personnel transporting subjects for lockup in Berkley shall adhere to Berkley's Department of Public Safety Rules and Regulations concerning lockup. (ii) <u>Huntington Woods Input</u>. If the Huntington Woods Director of Public Safety objects to a Rule or Regulation utilized in the provision of Lockup Services to Berkley, the Huntington Woods Director of Public Safety or his/her designee shall submit Huntington Woods's objection in writing to the Berkley Director of Public Safety. The Berkley Director of Public Safety or his/her designee shall respond to same in writing within 72 hours, providing such facts and opinions which support his/her determination of the issue. In the event that the matter is not resolved to Huntington Woods's satisfaction, the Berkley City Manager and the Huntington Woods City Manager shall meet to review the matter.

Huntington Woods is not responsible for the customs, policies, or practices of Berkley as related to the operation of the jail facility or the provision of Lockup Services. Huntington Woods is not responsible for the hiring, supervision, or training of jail personnel. Huntington Woods is not responsible for the jail building, its operation, or its design.

(iii) <u>*Personnel*</u>. The Municipalities agree that no personnel are required to be transferred from Huntington Woods to Berkley to provide the Lockup Services called for in this Agreement.

(iv) <u>Lockup Documents</u>. The Municipalities shall exchange copies of all reports, correspondences, and other documents which each community produces regarding the lockup facility as requested. The recipient of these documents shall treat them in the same manner the provider treats them. Documents which are confidential shall be marked as such and shall be treated in accordance with the provider's instructions.

k. <u>Equity and Assets</u>. All equity in assets and equipment of Berkley's lockup facility shall remain the property of Berkley. Payment for services provided pursuant to this Agreement shall not entitle Huntington Woods to any interest of any kind in such assets or equipment; provided, however, that any assets or equipment purchased by Huntington Woods shall be returned to Huntington Woods in the event of termination of this Agreement.

3. <u>Animal Control Services</u>. The Municipalities agree that Berkley shall provide Animal Control Services to Huntington Woods as follows:

a. Berkley will provide an Animal Control Officer within the corporate limits of Huntington Woods to provide the following services. During times when the Animal Control Officer is not on duty, Huntington Woods will be responsible for handling these services.

(i) Enforcement of state laws and local ordinances, where applicable, regarding animals within the corporate limits of Huntington Woods, including but not limited to, leash regulations, dogs at large, and licensing laws.

(ii) Issuance of violation tickets where appropriate and appearance in Court when required to prosecute said violations. The Animal Control Officer may follow up with chronic violators if deemed necessary.

(iii) Impoundment of stray, vicious, or dangerous animals.

(iv) Retention of impounded animals in accordance with minimum time requirements set forth by state law.

(v) Providing that impounded animals that are not placed or returned to their owners shall humanely be disposed of in accordance with applicable laws consistent with this Agreement.

(vi) Providing for the transfer of injured animals to veterinary care when appropriate. When immediate disposal of injured animals is determined to be necessary by the Animal Control Officer, Huntington Woods will be responsible for humane disposal of the animals. Huntington Woods will also be responsible for the cost of emergency veterinary care of injured animals within its corporate limits.

(vii) Conducting animal bite investigations of persons bitten by animals within the corporate limits of Huntington Woods, including but not limited to:

(A) Preparation of a standard Incident Report documenting the reported details of the bite incident;

(B) Investigation of the circumstances of the bite incident;

(C) Investigation and/or verification of appropriate vaccinations received by the animal prior to the bite incident;

(D) Impoundment or quarantine, as appropriate, of the involved animal for such period of time as required by state law;

(E) Enforcement of state laws or local ordinances, as may be appropriate, regarding the bite incident; and

(F) Humane destruction of the offending animal, as appropriate, in accordance with respective state laws, city ordinances, and/or court orders.

(viii) Providing for the drop-off of stray animals at the appropriate Animal Shelter, when picked up by Huntington Woods officers during hours when the Animal Control Officer is not on duty.

(ix) Responding and handling wildlife calls when a human is bitten or injured by the animal.

(x) Providing for a system to ensure that impounded animals released to Huntington Woods residents have appropriate vaccinations when required by law and have valid Huntington Woods licenses when required by Huntington Woods ordinance, either prior to release from impoundment or within a reasonable period of time thereafter.

(xi) Providing for removal of dead non-domestic animals from primary roads within the corporate limits of Huntington Woods having posted speed limits of 30 mph or greater.

(xii) Providing for removal of dead domestic animals, such as dogs and cats, from primary roads and residential streets within the corporate limits of Huntington Woods.

b. In connection with the Animal Control Services, Berkley shall have responsibility for the following:

(i) Determination of the number of said employee(s) providing the services.

- (ii) Selection and hiring of said employee(s).
- (iii) Payment of wages and other compensation to said employee(s).
- (iv) Direct managerial supervision of said employee(s).

(v) Determination of the work hours of said employee(s), with the understanding that it is the intent of this Agreement that services are to be provided Monday through Friday during normal business hours to be specifically determined by Berkley, with provisions for after-hour call-ins for emergency purposes.

c. Berkley shall provide and manage an appropriate holding facility for impounded animals.

d. Berkley shall provide an appropriate animal control vehicle to be operated by the said Animal Control Officer(s), and will be responsible for gasoline, maintenance, and insurance of the vehicle.

e. In connection with the providing of Animal Control Services by Berkley, Huntington Woods understands and agrees to the following:

(i) The Animal Control Officer(s) will not be assigned exclusively to Huntington Woods, but will carry out duties in Huntington Woods as necessary to comply with this Agreement.

(ii) Huntington Woods shall authorize and empower the Berkley Animal Control Officer(s) to enforce animal regulations within the corporate limits of Huntington Woods. (iii) Huntington Woods shall provide police assistance to the Animal Control Officer(s), if requested, when an Animal Control Officer is performing services within the corporate limits of Huntington Woods.

(iv) When animals require transfer to the Oakland County Animal Control facility, Huntington Woods shall reimburse Berkley for drop-off fees incurred.

f. In connection with the providing of Animal Control Services by Berkley, it is agreed that any revenue shall be distributed as follows:

(i) Revenue generated from the sale of City of Huntington Woods dog licenses shall accrue to Huntington Woods.

(ii) Revenue generated from the sale of City of Berkley dog licenses shall accrue to Berkley.

(iii) Revenue generated from District Court fines resulting from the enforcement of animal regulations within the corporate limits of Huntington Woods shall accrue to Huntington Woods.

(iv) Revenue generated from District Court fines resulting from the enforcement of animal regulations within the corporate limits of Berkley shall accrue to Berkley.

4. <u>Use of Berkley Department of Public Safety Firearms Range</u>. Berkley agrees to allow Huntington Woods public safety personnel to utilize the firearms range located in the Berkley Department of Public Safety building while this agreement is in effect under the following terms:

a. A qualified Huntington Woods firearms instructor/range officer will be present at all times Huntington Woods personnel use the range.

b. Huntington Woods personnel will provide their own ammunition and targets.

c. At its own expense, Huntington Woods will repair any damage caused by Huntington Woods personnel while using the range.

5. <u>Public Safety Dispatch Services.</u> The Municipalities agree that Berkley shall provide Public Safety Dispatch Services as follows:

a. Public Safety Dispatch Services will include any emergency or nonemergency communications of any kind received by the Berkley Department of Public Safety which requests, requires, or in the sole judgment of the Berkley Public Safety Department, appears to request or require the presence, attention or services of Huntington Woods Public Safety personnel to address, respond, or attend to any issue, event, or circumstance involving public health or safety, an accident, an injury, the protection of property, or any emergency (including but not limited to medical, fire and/or health).

b. In connection with Berkley's provision of Public Safety Dispatch Services to Huntington Woods, the parties agree to the following procedures:

(i) Berkley Department of Public Safety will receive all 911 calls and provide 24-hour a day radio communications, in accordance with Federal Communications Commission (FCC) procedures and requirements, for the City of Huntington Woods.

(ii) Berkley Department of Public Safety understands the commitment by the Huntington Woods Public Safety Department to achieve and maintain the CALEA standards for accreditation and will comply with the established professional standards. The Huntington Woods Public Safety Department has provided the Berkley Department of Public Safety with General Order #068 (titled Communications/Dispatch) containing all CALEA standards related to the communications function.

(iii) Berkley Department of Public Safety will comply with all applicable communications standards relating to the Huntington Woods Public Safety Department radio and dispatch communications policy.

(iv) Berkley Department of Public Safety shall not incur any costs related to the implementation of the standards set forth in the Huntington Woods General Order.

c. Huntington Woods acknowledges and agrees that except for the public safety dispatch services contracted for herein and the other services set forth in this Agreement, neither the City of Berkley nor the Berkley Department of Public Safety shall be obligated in any other way to provide or assist the City of Huntington Woods or Huntington Woods Public Safety personnel with any other direct or indirect backup or supplemental support or police, fire or emergency-related services or protection of any kind or nature, nor will there be any obligation to send Berkley Department of Public Safety personnel to respond, in any way, to any call for police, fire or emergency services. In all circumstances, Huntington Woods shall remain solely and exclusively responsible for all costs and liabilities associated with providing available Huntington Woods Public Safety personnel to receive and respond to public safety dispatch service in a timely and professional manner.

d. Huntington Woods acknowledges there may be circumstances when, despite reasonable Berkley Department of Public Safety efforts, the Berkley Public Safety Department's attempt to communicate or provide public safety dispatch services for and to Huntington Woods Public Safety personnel may be unsuccessful. This Agreement does not, and is not intended to, include any warranty, promise, or guarantee of any kind concerning the provision of public safety dispatch services by the Berkley Department of Public Safety to Huntington Woods Public Safety personnel, except that the Berkley

Department of Public Safety will make a reasonable effort to provide such public safety dispatch services and will do so consistent with existing and future Berkley Department of Public Safety communication and dispatch policies, procedures, orders, and standards, and applicable federal and state requirements.

e. This Agreement does not, nor is it intended to, obligate or require the Berkley Department of Public Safety to change, alter, modify, or develop any different dispatch related procedures, policies, or standards, or to purchase or use any special or additional equipment, or to prohibit the Berkley Department of Public Safety from implementing any future communication-related changes the Berkley Public Safety Department, in its sole judgment and discretion, believes to be in its best interest.

f. Huntington Woods shall be solely and exclusively responsible during the term of this Agreement for (i) providing its personnel with radios and communication equipment that will be properly set, adjusted, and maintained to receive any public safety dispatch service from the Berkley Department of Public Safety; (ii) complying with all current and future Berkley Department of Public Safety dispatching procedures, policies, standards, technical specifications, and applicable federal and state communication requirements; (iii) adequately training Huntington Woods Public Safety personnel; and (iv) promptly and properly notifying the Berkley Department of Public Safety of any onduty or off-duty status and availability or unavailability of Huntington Woods Public Safety personnel to receive public safety dispatch services.

g. Huntington Woods shall be solely and exclusively responsible for all costs, expenses, and liabilities associated with the acquisition, purchase, lease, operation, use, and maintenance of any Huntington Woods Public Safety radio or other communication equipment. The Berkley Department of Public Safety shall not be obligated to provide Huntington Woods Public Safety with any radio or communication equipment of any kind.

h. The Berkley Department of Public Safety may, at its sole discretion and expense, inspect any Huntington Woods Public Safety radio or other communication equipment to ensure that it conforms to Berkley Department of Public Safety dispatching procedures, polices, standards, technical specifications, and federal and state requirements. If the inspection reveals nonconformance, the Berkley Department of Public Safety shall notify Huntington Woods Public Safety in writing about the specific nonconformities. Huntington Woods Public Safety shall promptly address and correct the nonconformities at its own expense. If Huntington Woods Public Safety fails to do so, the Berkley Department of Public Safety may terminate or cancel the Public Safety Dispatch Services set forth in this Agreement.

6. <u>Insurance Coverage</u>. Huntington Woods shall obtain and maintain in force during the term of this Agreement insurance coverage for general liability with limits of liability not less than \$5,000,000 combined single limit for personal injury and property damage for claims arising out of the subject matter of this Agreement. Huntington Woods shall also obtain and maintain motor vehicle liability and worker's compensation in amounts it determines to be appropriate, with Berkley being named as an additional insured on all liability policies and entitled to copies of Certificates of Insurance confirming the required insurance during the entire term of this

Agreement. Huntington Woods shall add Berkley as an additional insured for these liabilities. Berkley shall add Huntington Woods as an additional insured under its policy for the services provided under this Agreement.

7. <u>Liability and Indemnification</u>. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Huntington Woods agrees to hold Berkley harmless from any and all claims, suits, demands, judgments, or causes of action made against Berkley, its elected or appointed officials, employees, agents, or volunteers for the actions of Huntington Woods's elected or appointed officials, employees, agents, or volunteers arising from or in connection with the performance of this Agreement. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Berkley agrees to hold Huntington Woods harmless from any and all claims, suits, demands, judgments, or causes of action made against Berkley, its elected or appointed officials, employees, agents, or volunteers, for the actions of Berkley's elected or appointed officials, employees, agents, or volunteers arising from or in connection with performance of this Agreement. Except as provided herein, neither Municipality shall have any right under any legal principle to be indemnified by the other Municipality or any of its employees or agents in connection with any claim.

In executing this Agreement, Berkley does not assume liability or responsibility for, or in any way release, Huntington Woods from any liability or responsibility to the extent that it arises from the existence or effect of Huntington Woods' City Charter, ordinances, policies, rules or regulations. To the extent that any cause, claim, suit, action, or administrative proceeding is commenced in which the enforceability and/or validity of any such Charter provision, ordinance, policy, rule, or regulation is at issue, Huntington Woods shall defend the same at its sole expense and, if judgment is entered or damages are awarded against Huntington Woods, Huntington Woods shall fully satisfy the same including all chargeable costs and reasonable attorney fees. In the event of a claim, loss or liability based upon the alleged concurrent or joint negligence or tortious wrongdoing of the parties, the parties shall bear their respective liability, including costs, in accordance with the laws of the State of Michigan.

8. <u>Governmental Immunity and Authority Unaffected</u>. Nothing in this Agreement is intended, nor shall it operate to diminish, delegate, divest, impair, or contravene any constitutional, statutory, and/or other legal right, privilege, power, obligation, duty, capacity, immunity or character of office including, but not limited to, governmental immunity on behalf of either Municipality or any of its agents.

9. <u>*Term of Agreement*</u>. This Agreement shall be effective for a term commencing on July 1, 2025 and continuing until June 30, 2029.

a. This Agreement may be terminated at any time for any reason, and with or without cause, by the written agreement of Berkley and Huntington Woods, approved by the concurrent resolutions of Berkley City Council and Huntington Woods City Council. Said agreement shall provide a period of at least 90 days before the termination becomes effective and the services set forth in this Agreement are discontinued.

b. This Agreement may be terminated by Berkley if Huntington Woods fails to pay any amount owing under this Agreement, including applicable late charges and interest, within 60 days of when the payment was due. Such termination by Berkley shall be by written notice to Huntington Woods that contains a clearly stated effective date of the termination that is at least 30 days after the date of the notice. If all amounts owing, including past due installments, late charges, interest, and any new installments coming due during that time are not paid, the termination shall be effective, relieving Berkley from any obligation to provide any further services under this Agreement. Before Berkley gives notice of termination under this provision, it shall first notify Huntington Woods of its failure to timely pay the amount owed and allow a reasonable opportunity for Huntington Woods to pay such amount.

c. In addition to a termination under subsections (a) and (b), either Municipality may terminate this Agreement for any reason, and with or without cause, by written notice to the other Municipality. During the Initial Term, one (1) year written notice shall be required before termination. During any subsequent term, six (6) months' written notice shall be required before termination.

10. <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries</u>. The sole and exclusive purpose of this Agreement is to set forth the terms by which Berkley will provide certain law enforcement services for Huntington Woods. This Agreement is not intended to, and does not create any special or other duty, obligation, promise, benefit or right to services not herein described in favor or for the benefit of any person, entity, or organization that is not a party to this Agreement.

11. <u>Compensation</u>. In consideration for the services provided by Berkley under this Agreement, Huntington Woods will pay Berkley an annual amount equal to \$6,500 for each fulltime equivalent (FTE) reflected in the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards (MCOLES) Fall Semi-Annual Law Enforcement Distribution Report for Huntington Woods Department of Public Safety. As of the date of this Agreement, the most recent MCOLES Report allocated 17 FTEs to the Huntington Woods Department of Public Safety. Huntington Woods will be billed on a quarterly basis, in equal installments. Payment is due within thirty (30) days after invoicing by Berkley.

12. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. Berkley shall provide the services set forth in this Agreement to Huntington Woods as an independent contractor, with Berkley being responsible for all workers' compensation and other insurance, income tax, social security, and other withholding, and all other compensation or benefits for Berkley employees involved in providing the services. At no time shall any Berkley employee involved in providing services be considered or claimed be to an employee or agent of Huntington Woods, and Huntington Woods shall not be deemed or allowed to control, supervise, or direct Berkley employees involved in providing the services.

13. <u>Assignments</u>. Berkley's obligations under this Agreement may not be assigned except with the approval of Huntington Woods.

14. *Notices.* Any notices provided under this Agreement shall be in writing to the Berkley City Manager and Huntington Woods City Manager at the addresses listed on Page 1.

15. <u>Amendments</u>. Amendments to this Agreement shall be in writing, approved by concurrent resolutions of Berkley City Council and Huntington Woods City Council, and be signed by authorized representatives of the Municipalities.

16. <u>Severability</u>. If a court of competent jurisdiction finds a term, or condition, of this Agreement to be illegal or invalid, then the term, or condition, shall be deemed severed from this Agreement. All other terms, conditions, and provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

17. <u>Applicable Law</u>. This Agreement is made and entered into in the State of Michigan and shall in all respects be interpreted, enforced and governed under the laws of the State of Michigan. The language of all parts of this Agreement is intended to and, in all cases, shall be construed as a whole, according to its fair meaning, and not construed strictly for or against any Municipality. As used in this Agreement, the singular or plural number, possessive or non-possessive, shall be deemed to include the other whenever the context so suggests or requires.

18. <u>No Waiver</u>. Absent an express written waiver, the failure of a Municipality to pursue any right granted under this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of that right regarding any existing or subsequent breach or default under this Agreement. No failure or delay on the part of a Municipality in exercising any right, power or privilege hereunder shall operate as a waiver thereof, nor shall a single or partial exercise of any right, power or privilege preclude any other or further exercise of any other right, power or privilege.

19. <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. Each Municipality shall comply with all federal, state, and local statutes, ordinances, regulations, administrative rules, and requirements applicable to its activities performed under this Agreement.

20. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement contains the entire Agreement of the Municipalities with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement, and supersedes all prior negotiations, agreements and understandings with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.

21. *Filing*. As provided in MCL 124.510, this Agreement and any amendments of it shall be filed with the Oakland County Clerk and Michigan Secretary of State before taking effect.

Madam Mayor and Members of City Council,

Background

- Based on major incident debriefs, experience, and public safety best practices, the Department
 has identified the need to purchase an Emergency Utility Task Vehicle. This UTV will be used for
 special events, park patrols, downtown patrols, and can be used for general patrol. The UTV can
 be completely enclosed, will have heat and air conditioning and will carry police, fire, and medical
 equipment. It will also be licensed to be driven on the street.
- Department of Public Safety's FY 2025-2026 budget includes \$40,000 to purchase a Polaris Emergency Utility Task Vehicle.
- The Department requests to purchase a Polaris Emergency Utility Task Vehicle for \$39,653.80
- This vehicle will replace an existing marked police vehicle that has high mileage, high engine hours, and is due for changeover, which will be offered to other city departments/removed from the fleet and auctioned.
- The RANGER Crew XP 1000 Northstar Edition Premium UTV has proven to be a safe and reliable and has been purchased by many police/fire/DPS agencies, most recently the Bloomfield Township Police Department.

MASTER AGREEMENT #091024 CATEGORY: Utility, Transport, Golf, and Recreation Vehicles with Related Accessories, Equipment and Services SUPPLIER: Polaris Sales Inc.

This Master Agreement (Agreement) is between Sourcewell, a Minnesota service cooperative located at 202 12th Street Northeast, P.O. Box 219, Staples, MN 56479 (Sourcewell) and Polaris Sales Inc., 2100 Hwy. 55, Medina, MN 55340 (Supplier).

Sourcewell is a local government and service cooperative created under the laws of the State of Minnesota (Minnesota Statutes Section 123A.21) offering a Cooperative Purchasing Program to eligible participating government entities.

Under this Master Agreement entered with Sourcewell, Supplier will provide Included Solutions to Participating Entities through Sourcewell's Cooperative Purchasing Program.

Article 1: General Terms

The General Terms in this Article 1 control the operation of this Master Agreement between Sourcewell and Supplier and apply to all transactions entered by Supplier and Participating Entities. Subsequent Articles to this Master Agreement control the rights and obligations directly between Sourcewell and Supplier (Article 2), and between Supplier and Participating Entity (Article 3), respectively. These Article 1 General Terms control over any conflicting terms. Where this Master Agreement is silent on any subject, Participating Entity and Supplier retain the ability to negotiate mutually acceptable terms.

- 1) **Purpose.** Pursuant to Minnesota law, the Sourcewell Board of Directors has authorized a Cooperative Purchasing Program designed to provide Participating Entities with access to competitively awarded cooperative purchasing agreements. To facilitate the Program, Sourcewell has awarded Supplier this cooperative purchasing Master Agreement following a competitive procurement process intended to meet compliance standards in accordance with Minnesota law and the requirements contained herein.
- 2) Intent. The intent of this Master Agreement is to define the roles of Sourcewell, Supplier, and Participating Entity as it relates to Sourcewell's Cooperative Purchasing Program.
- 3) Participating Entity Access. Sourcewell's Cooperative Purchasing Program Master Agreements are available to eligible public agencies (Participating Entities). A Participating Entity's authority to access Sourcewell's Cooperative Purchasing Program is determined through the laws of its respective jurisdiction.
- 4) **Supplier Access.** The Included Solutions offered under this Agreement may be made available to any Participating Entity. Supplier understands that a Participating Entity's use of this Agreement is at the Participating Entity's sole convenience. Supplier will educate its sales and service forces about

Sourcewell eligibility requirements and required documentation. Supplier will be responsible for ensuring sales are with Participating Entities.

- 5) **Term.** This Agreement is effective upon the date of the final signature below. The term of this Agreement is four (4) years from the effective date. The Agreement expires at 11:59 P.M. Central Time on November 13,2028, unless it is cancelled or extended as defined in this Agreement.
 - a) **Extensions.** Sourcewell and Supplier may agree to up to three (3) additional one-year extensions beyond the original four-year term. The total possible length of this Agreement will be seven (7) years from the effective date.
 - b) **Exceptional Circumstances.** Sourcewell retains the right to consider additional extensions as required under exceptional circumstances.
- 6) **Survival of Terms.** Notwithstanding the termination of this Agreement, the obligations of this Agreement will continue through the performance period of any transaction entered between Supplier and any Participating Entity before the termination date.
- 7) **Scope.** Supplier is awarded a Master Agreement to provide the solutions identified in RFP# 091024 to Participating Entities. In Scope solutions include:
 - a) Utility vehicles, task vehicles, cargo quad cycles, cargo tri cycles , golf carts, low-speed vehicles (LSV);
 - b) Parking enforcement, patrol and EMS solutions;
 - c) Passenger shuttles, burden carriers, tow tractors, baggage trucks;
 - d) Side-by-sides, all-terrain vehicles (ATV), snowmobiles, motorcycles, personal watercraft, amphibious vehicles, autonomous vehicles;
 - e) Food and beverage solutions, athletic and campus-use vehicles.
- 8) **Included Solutions.** Supplier's Proposal to the above referenced RFP is incorporated into this Master Agreement. Only those Solutions included within Supplier's Proposal and within Scope (Included Solutions) are included within the Agreement and may be offered to Participating Entities.
- 9) Indefinite Quantity. This Master Agreement defines an indefinite quantity of sales to eligible Participating Entities.
- 10) **Pricing.** Pricing information (including Pricing and Delivery and Pricing Offered tables) for all Included Solutions within Supplier's Proposal is incorporated into this Master Agreement.
- 11) Not to Exceed Pricing. Suppliers may not exceed the prices listed in the current Pricing List on file with Sourcewell when offering Included Solutions to Participating Entities. Participating Entities may request adjustments to pricing directly form Supplier during the negotiation and execution of any transaction.
- 12) Open Market. Supplier's open market pricing process is included within its Proposal.

13) Supplier Representations:

i) **Compliance.** Supplier represents and warrants it will provide all Included Solutions under this Agreement in full compliance with applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations.

ii) **Licenses.** As applicable, Supplier will maintain a valid status on all required federal, state, and local licenses, bonds, and permits required for the operation of Supplier's business with Participating Entities. Participating Entities may request all relevant documentation directly from Supplier.

iii) **Supplier Warrants.** Supplier warrants that all Included Solutions furnished under this Agreement are free from liens and encumbrances, and are free from defects in design, materials, and workmanship. In addition, Supplier warrants the Solutions are suitable for and will perform in accordance with the ordinary use for which they are intended.

- 14) **Bankruptcy Notices.** Supplier certifies and warrants it is not currently in a bankruptcy proceeding. Supplier has disclosed all current and completed bankruptcy proceedings within the past seven years within its Proposal. Supplier must provide notice in writing to Sourcewell if it enters a bankruptcy proceeding at any time during the term of this Agreement.
- 15) **Debarment and Suspension.** Supplier certifies and warrants that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from programs operated by the State of Minnesota, the United States federal government, or any Participating Entity. Supplier certifies and warrants that neither it nor its principals have been convicted of a criminal offense related to the subject matter of this Agreement. Supplier further warrants that it will provide immediate written notice to Sourcewell if this certification changes at any time during the term of this Agreement.
- 16) Provisions for non-United States federal entity procurements under United States federal awards or other awards (Appendix II to 2 C.F.R § 200). Participating Entities that use United States federal grant or other federal funding to purchase solutions from this Agreement may be subject to additional requirements including the procurement standards of the Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, 2 C.F.R. § 200. Participating Entities may have additional requirements based on specific funding source terms or conditions. Within this Section, all references to "federal" should be interpreted to mean the United States federal government. The following list applies when a Participating Entity accesses Supplier's Included Solutions with United States federal funds.

i) **EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY.** Except as otherwise provided under 41 C.F.R. § 60, all agreements that meet the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" in 41 C.F.R. § 60-1.3 must include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 C.F.R. § 60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, "Equal Employment Opportunity" (30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 C.F.R. §, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, "Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity," and implementing regulations at 41 C.F.R. § 60, "Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor." The equal opportunity clause is incorporated herein by reference.

DAVIS-BACON ACT, AS AMENDED (40 U.S.C. § 3141-3148). When required by federal ii) program legislation, all prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. § 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 5, "Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction"). In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. The Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the federal awarding agency. Supplier must comply with all applicable Davis-Bacon Act provisions.

iii) CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT (40 U.S.C. § 3701-3708).

Where applicable, all contracts awarded by the non-federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. §§ 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 5). Under 40 U.S.C. § 3702 of the Act, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. § 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies, materials, or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence. This provision is hereby incorporated by reference into this Agreement. Supplier certifies that during the term of an award for all Agreements by Sourcewell resulting from this procurement process, Supplier must comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

iv) **RIGHTS TO INVENTIONS MADE UNDER A CONTRACT OR AGREEMENT.** If the federal award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) and the recipient or subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the recipient or subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 C.F.R. § 401, "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency. Supplier

certifies that during the term of an award for all Agreements by Sourcewell resulting from this procurement process, Supplier must comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

v) **CLEAN AIR ACT (42 U.S.C. § 7401-7671Q.) AND THE FEDERAL WATER POLLUTION CONTROL ACT (33 U.S.C. § 1251-1387).** Contracts and subgrants of amounts in excess of \$150,000 require the non-federal award to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. § 7401- 7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251- 1387). Violations must be reported to the Federal awarding agency and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Supplier certifies that during the term of this Agreement it will comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

vi) **DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION (EXECUTIVE ORDERS 12549 AND 12689).** A contract award (see 2 C.F.R. § 180.220) must not be made to parties listed on the government wide exclusions in the System for Award Management (SAM), in accordance with the OMB guidelines at 2 C.F.R. § 180 that implement Executive Orders 12549 (3 C.F.R. § 1986 Comp., p. 189) and 12689 (3 C.F.R. § 1989 Comp., p. 235), "Debarment and Suspension." SAM Exclusions contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549. Supplier certifies that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation by any federal department or agency.

vii) **BYRD ANTI-LOBBYING AMENDMENT, AS AMENDED (31 U.S.C. § 1352).** Suppliers must file any required certifications. Suppliers must not have used federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any federal contract, grant, or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. § 1352. Suppliers must disclose any lobbying with non-federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the non-federal award. Suppliers must file all certifications and disclosures required by, and otherwise comply with, the Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment (31 U.S.C. § 1352).

viii) **RECORD RETENTION REQUIREMENTS.** To the extent applicable, Supplier must comply with the record retention requirements detailed in 2 C.F.R. § 200.333. The Supplier further certifies that it will retain all records as required by 2 C.F.R. § 200.333 for a period of 3 years after grantees or subgrantees submit final expenditure reports or quarterly or annual financial reports, as applicable, and all other pending matters are closed.

ix) **ENERGY POLICY AND CONSERVATION ACT COMPLIANCE.** To the extent applicable, Supplier must comply with the mandatory standards and policies relating to energy efficiency which are contained in the state energy conservation plan issued in compliance with the Energy Policy and Conservation Act.

x) **BUY AMERICAN PROVISIONS COMPLIANCE.** To the extent applicable, Supplier must comply with all applicable provisions of the Buy American Act. Purchases made in accordance with the Buy American Act must follow the applicable procurement rules calling for free and open competition.

xi) ACCESS TO RECORDS (2 C.F.R. § 200.336). Supplier agrees that duly authorized representatives of a federal agency must have access to any books, documents, papers and records of Supplier that are directly pertinent to Supplier's discharge of its obligations under this Agreement for the purpose of making audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcriptions. The right also includes timely and reasonable access to Supplier's personnel for the purpose of interview and discussion relating to such documents.

xii) **PROCUREMENT OF RECOVERED MATERIALS (2 C.F.R. § 200.322).** A non-federal entity that is a state agency or agency of a political subdivision of a state and its contractors must comply with Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. The requirements of Section 6002 include procuring only items designated in guidelines of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) at 40 C.F.R. § 247 that contain the highest percentage of recovered materials practicable, consistent with maintaining a satisfactory level of competition, where the purchase price of the item exceeds \$10,000 or the value of the quantity acquired during the preceding fiscal year exceeded \$10,000; procuring solid waste management services in a manner that maximizes energy and resource recovery; and establishing an affirmative procurement program for procurement of recovered materials identified in the EPA guidelines.

xiii) **FEDERAL SEAL(S), LOGOS, AND FLAGS.** The Supplier cannot use the seal(s), logos, crests, or reproductions of flags or likenesses of Federal agency officials without specific pre-approval.

xiv) **NO OBLIGATION BY FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.** The U.S. federal government is not a party to this Agreement or any purchase by a Participating Entity and is not subject to any obligations or liabilities to the Participating Entity, Supplier, or any other party pertaining to any matter resulting from the Agreement or any purchase by an authorized user.

xv) **PROGRAM FRAUD AND FALSE OR FRAUDULENT STATEMENTS OR RELATED ACTS.** The Contractor acknowledges that 31 U.S.C. § 38 (Administrative Remedies for False Claims and Statements) applies to the Supplier's actions pertaining to this Agreement or any purchase by a Participating Entity.

xvi) **FEDERAL DEBT.** The Supplier certifies that it is non-delinquent in its repayment of any federal debt. Examples of relevant debt include delinquent payroll and other taxes, audit disallowance, and benefit overpayments.

xvii) **CONFLICTS OF INTEREST.** The Supplier must notify the U.S. Office of General Services, Sourcewell, and Participating Entity as soon as possible if this Agreement or any aspect related to the anticipated work under this Agreement raises an actual or potential conflict of interest (as described in 2 C.F.R. Part 200). The Supplier must explain the actual or potential conflict in writing in sufficient detail so that the U.S. Office of General Services, Sourcewell, and Participating Entity are able to assess the actual or potential conflict; and provide any additional information as necessary or requested.

xviii) **U.S. EXECUTIVE ORDER 13224.** The Supplier, and its subcontractors, must comply with U.S. Executive Order 13224 and U.S. Laws that prohibit transactions with and provision of resources and support to individuals and organizations associated with terrorism.

xix) **PROHIBITION ON CERTAIN TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND VIDEO SURVEILLANCE SERVICES OR EQUIPMENT.** To the extent applicable, Supplier certifies that during the term of this Agreement it will comply with applicable requirements of 2 C.F.R. § 200.216.

xx) **DOMESTIC PREFERENCES FOR PROCUREMENTS.** To the extent applicable, Supplier certifies that during the term of this Agreement, Supplier will comply with applicable requirements of 2 C.F.R. § 200.322.

Article 2: Sourcewell and Supplier Obligations

The Terms in this Article 2 relate specifically to Sourcewell and its administration of this Master Agreement with Supplier and Supplier's obligations thereunder.

- 1) Authorized Sellers. Supplier must provide Sourcewell a current means to validate or authenticate Supplier's authorized dealers, distributors, or resellers which may complete transactions of Included Solutions offered under this Agreement. Sourcewell may request updated information in its discretion, and Supplier agrees to provide requested information within a reasonable time.
- 2) **Product and Price Changes Requirements.** Supplier may request Included Solutions changes, additions, or deletions at any time. All requests must be made in writing by submitting a Sourcewell Price and Product Change Request Form to Sourcewell. At a minimum, the request must:
 - Identify the applicable Sourcewell Agreement number;
 - Clearly specify the requested change;
 - Provide sufficient detail to justify the requested change;
 - Individually list all Included Solutions affected by the requested change, along with the requested change (e.g., addition, deletion, price change); and
 - Include a complete restatement of Pricing List with the effective date of the modified pricing, or product addition or deletion. The new pricing restatement must include all Included Solutions offered, even for those items where pricing remains unchanged.

A fully executed Sourcewell Price and Product Change Request Form will become an amendment to this Agreement and will be incorporated by reference.

- 3) Authorized Representative. Supplier will assign an Authorized Representative to Sourcewell for this Agreement and must provide prompt notice to Sourcewell if that person is changed. The Authorized Representative will be responsible for:
 - Maintenance and management of this Agreement;
 - Timely response to all Sourcewell and Participating Entity inquiries; and
 - Participation in reviews with Sourcewell.

Sourcewell's Authorized Representative is its Chief Procurement Officer.

4) **Performance Reviews.** Supplier will perform a minimum of one review with Sourcewell per agreement year. The review will cover transactions to Participating Entities, pricing and terms,

administrative fees, sales data reports, performance issues, supply chain issues, customer issues, and any other necessary information.

- 5) Sales Reporting Required. Supplier is required as a material element to this Master Agreement to report all completed transactions with Participating Entities utilizing this Agreement. Failure to provide complete and accurate reports as defined herein will be a material breach of the Agreement and Sourcewell reserves the right to pursue all remedies available at law including cancellation of this Agreement.
- 6) Reporting Requirements. Supplier must provide Sourcewell an activity report of all transactions completed utilizing this Agreement. Reports are due at least once each calendar quarter (Reporting Period). Reports must be received no later than 45 calendar days after the end of each calendar quarter. Supplier may report on a more frequent basis in its discretion. Reports must be provided regardless of the amount of completed transactions during that quarter (i.e., if there are no sales, Supplier must submit a report indicating no sales were made).

The Report must contain the following fields:

- Participating Entity Name (e.g., City of Staples Highway Department);
- Participating Entity Physical Street Address;
- Participating Entity City;
- Participating Entity State/Province;
- Participating Entity Zip/Postal Code;
- Sourcewell Participating Entity Account Number;
- Transaction Description;
- Transaction Purchased Price;
- Sourcewell Administrative Fee Applied; and
- Date Transaction was invoiced/sale was recognized as revenue by Supplier.

If collected by Supplier, the Report may include the following fields as available:

- Participating Entity Contact Name;
- Participating Entity Contact Email Address;
- Participating Entity Contact Telephone Number;
- 7) Administrative Fee. In consideration for the support and services provided by Sourcewell, Supplier will pay an Administrative Fee to Sourcewell on all completed transactions to Participating Entities utilizing this Agreement. Supplier will include its Administrative Fee within its proposed pricing. Supplier may not directly charge Participating Entities to offset the Administrative Fee.
- 8) **Fee Calculation.** Supplier's Administrative Fee payable to Sourcewell will be calculated as a stated percentage (listed in Supplier's Proposal) of all completed transactions utilizing this Master Agreement within the preceding Reporting Period. For certain categories, a flat fee may be proposed. The Administrative Fee will be stated in Supplier's Proposal.
- 9) Fee Remittance. Supplier will remit fee to Sourcewell no later than 45 calendar days after the close of the preceding calendar quarter in conjunction with Supplier's Reporting Period obligations defined herein. Payments should note the Supplier's name and Sourcewell-assigned Agreement number in the memo; and must be either mailed to Sourcewell above "Attn: Accounts Receivable" or

remitted electronically to Sourcewell's banking institution per Sourcewell's Finance department instructions.

- 10) **Noncompliance.** Sourcewell reserves the right to seek all remedies available at law for unpaid or underpaid Administrative Fees due under this Agreement. Failure to remit payment, delinquent payments, underpayments, or other deviations from the requirements of this Agreement may be deemed a material breach and may result in cancellation of this Agreement and disbarment from future Agreements.
- 11) Audit Requirements. Pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 16C.05, subdivision 5, the books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices relevant to this Agreement are subject to examination by Sourcewell and the Minnesota State Auditor for a minimum of six years from the end of this Agreement. Supplier agrees to fully cooperate with Sourcewell in auditing transactions under this Agreement to ensure compliance with pricing terms, correct calculation and remittance of Administrative Fees, and verification of transactions as may be requested by a Participating Entity or Sourcewell.
- 12) Assignment, Transfer, and Administrative Changes. Supplier may not assign or otherwise transfer its rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of Sourcewell. Such consent will not be unreasonably withheld. Sourcewell reserves the right to unilaterally assign all or portions of this Agreement within its sole discretion to address corporate restructurings, mergers, acquisitions, or other changes to the Responsible Party and named in the Agreement. Any prohibited assignment is invalid. Upon request Sourcewell may make administrative changes to agreement documentation such as name changes, address changes, and other non-material updates as determined within its sole discretion.
- 13) **Amendments.** Any material change to this Agreement must be executed in writing through an amendment and will not be effective until it has been duly executed by the parties.
- 14) **Waiver.** Failure by Sourcewell to enforce any right under this Agreement will not be deemed a waiver of such right in the event of the continuation or repetition of the circumstances giving rise to such right.
- 15) **Complete Agreement.** This Agreement represents the complete agreement between the parties for the scope as defined herein. Supplier and Sourcewell may enter into separate written agreements relating specifically to transactions outside of the scope of this Agreement.
- 16) **Relationship of Sourcewell and Supplier.** This Agreement does not create a partnership, joint venture, or any other relationship such as employee, independent contractor, master-servant, or principal-agent.
- 17) Indemnification. Supplier must indemnify, defend, save, and hold Sourcewell, including their agents and employees, harmless from any claims or causes of action, including attorneys' fees incurred by Sourcewell, arising out of any act or omission in the performance of this Agreement by the Supplier or its agents or employees; this indemnification includes injury or death to person(s) or property alleged to have been caused by some defect in design, condition, or performance of Included Solutions under this Agreement. Sourcewell's responsibility will be governed by the State of Minnesota's Tort Liability Act (Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466) and other applicable law.

18) **Data Practices.** Supplier and Sourcewell acknowledge Sourcewell is subject to the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes Chapter 13. As it applies to all data created and maintained in performance of this Agreement, Supplier may be subject to the requirements of this chapter.

19) Grant of License.

- a) During the term of this Agreement:
 - i) **Supplier Promotion.** Sourcewell grants to Supplier a royalty-free, worldwide, non-exclusive right and license to use the trademark(s) provided to Supplier by Sourcewell in advertising, promotional materials, and informational sites for the purpose of marketing Sourcewell's Agreement with Supplier.
 - Sourcewell Promotion. Supplier grants to Sourcewell a royalty-free, worldwide, nonexclusive right and license to use Supplier's trademarks in advertising, promotional materials, and informational sites for the purpose of marketing Supplier's Agreement with Sourcewell.
- b) Limited Right of Sublicense. The right and license granted herein includes a limited right of each party to grant sublicenses to their respective subsidiaries, distributors, dealers, resellers, marketing representatives, partners, or agents (collectively "Permitted Sublicensees") in advertising, promotional, or informational materials for the purpose of marketing the Parties' relationship. Any sublicense granted will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Article. Each party will be responsible for any breach of this section by any of their respective sublicensees.

c) Use; Quality Control.

- i) Neither party may alter the other party's trademarks from the form provided and must comply with removal requests as to specific uses of its trademarks or logos.
- ii) Each party agrees to use, and to cause its Permitted Sublicensees to use, the other party's trademarks only in good faith and in a dignified manner consistent with such party's use of the trademarks. Each party may make written notice to the other regarding misuse under this section. The offending party will have 30 days of the date of the written notice to cure the issue or the license/sublicense will be terminated.
- d) **Termination.** Upon the termination of this Agreement for any reason, each party, including Permitted Sublicensees, will have 30 days to remove all Trademarks from signage, websites, and the like bearing the other party's name or logo (excepting Sourcewell's pre-printed catalog of suppliers which may be used until the next printing). Supplier must return all marketing and promotional materials, including signage, provided by Sourcewell, or dispose of it according to Sourcewell's written directions.
- 20) Venue and Governing law between Sourcewell and Supplier Only. The substantive and procedural laws of the State of Minnesota will govern this Agreement between Sourcewell and Supplier. Venue for all legal proceedings arising out of this Agreement between Sourcewell and Supplier will be in court of competent jurisdiction within the State of Minnesota. This section does not apply to any dispute between Supplier and Participating Entity. This Agreement reserves the right for Supplier and

Participating Entity to negotiate this term to within any transaction documents.

- 21) **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal, unenforceable, or void then both parties will be relieved from all obligations arising from that provision. If the remainder of this Agreement is capable of being performed, it will not be affected by such determination or finding and must be fully performed.
- 22) **Insurance Coverage.** At its own expense, Supplier must maintain valid insurance policy(ies) during the performance of this Agreement with insurance company(ies) licensed or authorized to do business in the State of Minnesota having an "AM BEST" rating of A- or better, with coverage and limits of insurance not less than the following:
 - a) **Commercial General Liability Insurance.** Supplier will maintain insurance covering its operations, with coverage on an occurrence basis, and must be subject to terms no less broad than the Insurance Services Office ("ISO") Commercial General Liability Form CG0001 (2001 or newer edition), or equivalent. At a minimum, coverage must include liability arising from premises, operations, bodily injury and property damage, independent contractors, products-completed operations including construction defect, contractual liability, blanket contractual liability, and personal injury and advertising injury. All required limits, terms and conditions of coverage must be maintained during the term of this Agreement.
 - \$1,500,000 each occurrence Bodily Injury and Property Damage
 - \$1,500,000 Personal and Advertising Injury
 - \$2,000,000 aggregate for products liability-completed operations
 - \$2,000,000 general aggregate
 - b) Certificates of Insurance. Prior to execution of this Agreement, Supplier must furnish to Sourcewell a certificate of insurance, as evidence of the insurance required under this Agreement. Prior to expiration of the policy(ies), renewal certificates must be mailed to Sourcewell, 202 12th Street Northeast, P.O. Box 219, Staples, MN 56479 or provided to in an alternative manner as directed by Sourcewell. The certificates must be signed by a person authorized by the insurer(s) to bind coverage on their behalf. Failure of Supplier to maintain the required insurance and documentation may constitute a material breach.
 - c) Additional Insured Endorsement and Primary and Non-contributory Insurance Clause. Supplier agrees to list Sourcewell, including its officers, agents, and employees, as an additional insured under the Supplier's commercial general liability insurance policy with respect to liability arising out of activities, "operations," or "work" performed by or on behalf of Supplier, and products and completed operations of Supplier. The policy provision(s) or endorsement(s) must further provide that coverage is primary and not excess over or contributory with any other valid, applicable, and collectible insurance or self-insurance in force for the additional insureds.
 - d) **Waiver of Subrogation.** Supplier waives and must require (by endorsement or otherwise) all its insurers to waive subrogation rights against Sourcewell and other additional insureds for losses paid under the insurance policies required by this Agreement or other insurance applicable to the Supplier or its subcontractors. The waiver must apply to all deductibles and/or self-insured retentions applicable to the required or any other insurance maintained by the Supplier or its subcontractors. Where permitted by law, Supplier must require similar written express waivers of subrogation and insurance clauses from each of its subcontractors.

- e) Umbrella/Excess Liability/SELF-INSURED RETENTION. The limits required by this Agreement can be met by either providing a primary policy or in combination with umbrella/excess liability policy(ies), or self-insured retention.
- 23) **Termination for Convenience.** Sourcewell or Supplier may terminate this Agreement upon 60 calendar days' written notice to the other Party. Termination pursuant to this section will not relieve the Supplier's obligations under this Agreement for any transactions entered with Participating Entities through the date of termination, including reporting and payment of applicable Administrative Fees.
- 24) **Termination for Cause.** Sourcewell may terminate this Agreement upon providing written notice of material breach to Supplier. Notice must describe the breach in reasonable detail and state the intent to terminate the Agreement. Upon receipt of Notice, the Supplier will have 30 calendar days in which it must cure the breach. Termination pursuant to this section will not relieve the Supplier's obligations under this Agreement for any transactions entered with Participating Entities through the date of termination, including reporting and payment of applicable Administrative Fees.

Article 3: Supplier Obligations to Participating Entities

The Terms in this Article 3 relate specifically to Supplier and a Participating Entity when entering transactions utilizing the General Terms established in this Master Agreement. Article 1 General Terms control over any conflict with this Article 3. Where this Master Agreement is silent on any subject, Participating Entity and Supplier retain the ability to negotiate mutually acceptable terms.

- Quotes to Participating Entities. Suppliers are encouraged to provide all pricing information regarding the total cost of acquisition when quoting to a Participating Entity. Suppliers and Participating Entities are encouraged to include all cost specifically associated with or included within the Suppliers proposal and Included Solutions within transaction documents.
- 2) Shipping, Delivery, Acceptance, Rejection, and Warranty. Supplier's proposal may include proposed terms relating to shipping, delivery, inspection, and acceptance/rejection and other relevant terms of tendered Solutions. Supplier and Participating Entity may negotiate final terms appropriate for the specific transaction relating to non-appropriation, shipping, delivery, inspection, acceptance/rejection of tendered Solutions, and warranty coverage for Included Solutions. Such terms may include, but are not limited to, costs, risk of loss, proper packaging, inspection rights and timelines, acceptance or rejection procedures, and remedies as mutually agreed include notice requirements, replacement, return or exchange procedures, and associated costs.
- 3) **Applicable Taxes.** Participating Entity is responsible for notifying supplier of its tax-exempt status and for providing Supplier with any valid tax-exemption certification(s) or related documentation.
- 4) **Ordering Process and Payment.** Supplier's ordering process and acceptable forms of payment are included within its Proposal. Participating Entities will be solely responsible for payment to Supplier and Sourcewell will have no liability for any unpaid invoice of any Participating Entity.

- 5) **Transaction Documents.** Participating Entity may require the use of its own forms to complete transactions directly with Supplier utilizing the terms established in this Agreement. Supplier's standard form agreements may be offered as part of its Proposal. Supplier and Participating Entity may complete and document transactions utilizing any type of transaction documents as mutually agreed. In any transaction document entered utilizing this Agreement, Supplier and Participating Entity must include specific reference to this Master Agreement by number and to Participating Entity's unique Sourcewell account number.
- 6) Additional Terms and Conditions Permitted. Participating Entity and Supplier may negotiate and include additional terms and conditions within transaction documentation as mutually agreed. Such terms may supplant or supersede this Master Agreement when necessary and as solely determined by Participating Entity. Sourcewell has expressly reserved the right for Supplier and Participating Entity to address any necessary provisions within transaction documents not expressly included within this Master Agreement, including but not limited to transaction cancellation, dispute resolution, governing law and venue, non-appropriation, insurance, defense and indemnity, force majeure, and other material terms as mutually agreed.
- 7) **Subsequent Agreements and Survival.** Supplier and Participating Entity may enter into a separate agreement to facilitate long-term performance obligations utilizing the terms of this Master Agreement as mutually agreed. Such agreements may provide for a performance period extending beyond the full term of this Master Agreement as determined in the discretion of Participating Entity.
- 8) **Participating Addendums.** Supplier and Participating Entity may enter a Participating Addendum or similar document extending and supplementing the terms of this Master Agreement to facilitate adoption as may be required by a Participating Entity.

Background

- Department of Public Safety's FY 2025-2026 budget includes funds to purchase a marked police vehicle.
- DPS requests to purchase one 2025 Ford F150 Super Crew 4x4 Police Responder Pickup marked police vehicle for \$49,273.
- This vehicle will replace an existing marked police vehicle that has high mileage, high engine hours, and is due for changeover, which will be offered to other city departments/removed from the fleet and auctioned
- The purchase price of the vehicles includes a 36,000-mile or 36 month factory bumper to bumper warranty and a 100,000 mile or five-year powertrain warranty

Madam Mayor and Members of City Council,

Background

- The City of Berkley's FY 2026/2027 and FY 27/28 budget includes funds to purchase a Fire Engine to replace the current Engine 4, which has reached the NFPA end of service guidelines.
- The current Engine 4 is a 2007 Spartan Darley fire engine equipped with a 1500 gpm pump and a 1000-gallon water tank. It was purchased as a demo fire truck, which means it was delivered to the City with additional miles on the truck and hours on the pump from being demonstrated at other fire department around Michigan.
- Engine 4 is the main front-line fire engine which responds to all emergency incidents within the City of Berkley as well as to mutual aid requests to other communities within Oakland County. The current Engine 4 is equipped with a compressed air foam system (CAFS) that incorporates an air and foam mixture to further aid in fire suppression activities, however in the spring of 2023, the there was a failure of the onboard generator and the generator caught fire. The fire damaged airline, electrical wiring, the CAFS system, and destroyed the onboard generator. Due to the age of the fire truck, our insurance carrier chose not to replace the generator due to the cost. The generator supplied power to scene lights which is used to illuminate the emergency scene for personnel safety. The CAFS system is inoperable due to the generator being removed from the fire truck.
- Engine 4 carries in addition to fire suppression equipment, vehicle extrication tools (Jaws of Life), eclectic vehicle fire blanket, specialized rescue and stabilization equipment, and rapid intervention tools. Engine 4 is vital to emergency response capabilities. Due to the age of the apparatus, millage, and hours on equipment and components, Engine 4's maintenance cost is climbing each year due to normal wear and tear use. Fortunately, due to normally having a short response in terms of millage and aggressive preventive maintenance schedule, Engine 4 is in far better shape for its age compared to other agencies.
- The National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA) standard 1901, apparatus should be moved from front-line service after 15 years of age and from all emergency service after 25 years. The current Engine 4 does have a limited market where another agency would potentially purchase the fire tuck to place into service as a limited use reserve apparatus. There is at least one community in Michigan that would explore this option.

- DPS formed a committee that recommended the purchase of a Rosenbauer Commander Chassis with a Pumper Body with included Dealer Supplied Items (see included Rosenbauer documents for specifics), which will meet the needs of the Department now, and for the foreseeable future.
- With this purchase, all three of the BDPS apparatuses (Engine 4, Tower 4, and Squad 4) will be Rosenbauer products.
- The Public Improvements Fund #445-901-985-000 has \$300,000 budgeted in FY 26/27 and \$800,000 budgeted in FY 27/28 for this purchase, making the actual purchase \$70,000 over the budgeted amount. However, DPS was able to lock in the May, 2025 price for this purchase, eliminating additional increases.

Summary

- Engine 4 will be purchased from Front Line Services, Inc., 8588 Carter Rd., Freeland, MI 48623 utilizing the Sourcewell Cooperative Purchasing Contract # 113021-RSD (included)
- The Department purchased Tower 4 from Front Line Services, Inc. and all of the Department's apparatuses are also serviced by this vendor.
- Front Line Services, Inc. has done exceptional work and the Department is very pleased with their quality, price, and service.
- The Department will purchase Engine 4 utilizing budgeted funds in the Public Improvements Fund #445-901-985-000

Recommendation

This Contract is between Sourcewell, 202 12th Street Northeast, P.O. Box 219, Staples, MN 56479 (Sourcewell) and Rosenbauer America LLC, 100 Third St., Lyons, SD 57041 (Supplier).

Sourcewell is a State of Minnesota local government unit and service cooperative created under the laws of the State of Minnesota (Minnesota Statutes Section 123A.21) that offers cooperative procurement solutions to government entities. Participation is open to eligible federal, state/province, and municipal governmental entities, higher education, K-12 education, nonprofit, tribal government, and other public entities located in the United States and Canada. Sourcewell issued a public solicitation for Firefighting Apparatus and Fire Service Vehicles from which Supplier was awarded a contract.

Supplier desires to contract with Sourcewell to provide equipment, products, or services to Sourcewell and the entities that access Sourcewell's cooperative purchasing contracts (Participating Entities).

1. TERM OF CONTRACT

A. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Contract is effective upon the date of the final signature below.

B. EXPIRATION DATE AND EXTENSION. This Contract expires February 10, 2026, unless it is cancelled sooner pursuant to Article 22. This Contract may be extended one additional year upon the request of Sourcewell and written agreement by Supplier.

C. SURVIVAL OF TERMS. Notwithstanding any expiration or termination of this Contract, all payment obligations incurred prior to expiration or termination will survive, as will the following: Articles 11 through 14 survive the expiration or cancellation of this Contract. All other rights will cease upon expiration or termination of this Contract.

2. EQUIPMENT, PRODUCTS, OR SERVICES

A. EQUIPMENT, PRODUCTS, OR SERVICES. Supplier will provide the Equipment, Products, or Services as stated in its Proposal submitted under the Solicitation Number listed above. Supplier's Equipment, Products, or Services Proposal (Proposal) is attached and incorporated into this Contract.

All Equipment and Products provided under this Contract must be new and the current model. Supplier may offer close-out, refurbished, or remounted Equipment or Products if they are clearly indicated in Supplier's product and pricing list. Unless agreed to by the Participating Entities in advance, Equipment or Products must be delivered as operational to the Participating Entity's site.

This Contract offers an indefinite quantity of sales, and while substantial volume is anticipated, sales and sales volume are not guaranteed.

B. WARRANTY. Supplier warrants that all Equipment, Products, and Services furnished are free from liens and encumbrances, and are free from defects in design, materials, and workmanship. In addition, Supplier warrants the Equipment, Products, and Services are suitable for and will perform in accordance with the ordinary use for which they are intended. Supplier's dealers and distributors must agree to assist the Participating Entity in reaching a resolution in any dispute over warranty terms with the manufacturer. Any manufacturer's warranty that extends beyond the expiration of the Supplier's warranty will be passed on to the Participating Entity.

C. DEALERS, DISTRIBUTORS, AND/OR RESELLERS. Upon Contract execution and throughout the Contract term, Supplier must provide to Sourcewell a current means to validate or authenticate Supplier's authorized dealers, distributors, or resellers relative to the Equipment, Products, and Services offered under this Contract, which will be incorporated into this Contract by reference. It is the Supplier's responsibility to ensure Sourcewell receives the most current information.

3. PRICING

All Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract will be priced at or below the price stated in Supplier's Proposal.

When providing pricing quotes to Participating Entities, all pricing quoted must reflect a Participating Entity's total cost of acquisition. This means that the quoted cost is for delivered Equipment, Products, and Services that are operational for their intended purpose, and includes all costs to the Participating Entity's requested delivery location.

Regardless of the payment method chosen by the Participating Entity, the total cost associated with any purchase option of the Equipment, Products, or Services must always be disclosed in the pricing quote to the applicable Participating Entity at the time of purchase.

A. SHIPPING AND SHIPPING COSTS. All delivered Equipment and Products must be properly packaged. Damaged Equipment and Products may be rejected. If the damage is not readily apparent at the time of delivery, Supplier must permit the Equipment and Products to be returned within a reasonable time at no cost to Sourcewell or its Participating Entities.

Participating Entities reserve the right to inspect the Equipment and Products at a reasonable time after delivery where circumstances or conditions prevent effective inspection of the Equipment and Products at the time of delivery. In the event of the delivery of nonconforming Equipment and Products, the Participating Entity will notify the Supplier as soon as possible and the Supplier will replace nonconforming Equipment and Products that are acceptable to the Participating Entity.

Supplier must arrange for and pay for the return shipment on Equipment and Products that arrive in a defective or inoperable condition.

Sourcewell may declare the Supplier in breach of this Contract if the Supplier intentionally delivers substandard or inferior Equipment or Products.

B. SALES TAX. Each Participating Entity is responsible for supplying the Supplier with valid taxexemption certification(s). When ordering, a Participating Entity must indicate if it is a taxexempt entity.

C. HOT LIST PRICING. At any time during this Contract, Supplier may offer a specific selection of Equipment, Products, or Services at discounts greater than those listed in the Contract. When Supplier determines it will offer Hot List Pricing, it must be submitted electronically to Sourcewell in a line-item format. Equipment, Products, or Services may be added or removed from the Hot List at any time through a Sourcewell Price and Product Change Form as defined in Article 4 below.

Hot List program and pricing may also be used to discount and liquidate close-out and discontinued Equipment and Products as long as those close-out and discontinued items are clearly identified as such. Current ordering process and administrative fees apply. Hot List Pricing must be published and made available to all Participating Entities.

4. PRODUCT AND PRICING CHANGE REQUESTS

Supplier may request Equipment, Product, or Service changes, additions, or deletions at any time. All requests must be made in writing by submitting a signed Sourcewell Price and Product Change Request Form to the assigned Sourcewell Supplier Development Administrator. This approved form is available from the assigned Sourcewell Supplier Development Administrator. At a minimum, the request must:

- Identify the applicable Sourcewell contract number;
- Clearly specify the requested change;
- Provide sufficient detail to justify the requested change;
- Individually list all Equipment, Products, or Services affected by the requested change, along with the requested change (e.g., addition, deletion, price change); and

• Include a complete restatement of pricing documentation in Microsoft Excel with the effective date of the modified pricing, or product addition or deletion. The new pricing restatement must include all Equipment, Products, and Services offered, even for those items where pricing remains unchanged.

A fully executed Sourcewell Price and Product Change Request Form will become an amendment to this Contract and will be incorporated by reference.

5. PARTICIPATION, CONTRACT ACCESS, AND PARTICIPATING ENTITY REQUIREMENTS

A. PARTICIPATION. Sourcewell's cooperative contracts are available and open to public and nonprofit entities across the United States and Canada; such as federal, state/province, municipal, K-12 and higher education, tribal government, and other public entities.

The benefits of this Contract should be available to all Participating Entities that can legally access the Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract. A Participating Entity's authority to access this Contract is determined through its cooperative purchasing, interlocal, or joint powers laws. Any entity accessing benefits of this Contract will be considered a Service Member of Sourcewell during such time of access. Supplier understands that a Participating Entity's use of this Contract is at the Participating Entity's sole convenience and Participating Entities reserve the right to obtain like Equipment, Products, or Services from any other source.

Supplier is responsible for familiarizing its sales and service forces with Sourcewell contract use eligibility requirements and documentation and will encourage potential participating entities to join Sourcewell. Sourcewell reserves the right to add and remove Participating Entities to its roster during the term of this Contract.

B. PUBLIC FACILITIES. Supplier's employees may be required to perform work at governmentowned facilities, including schools. Supplier's employees and agents must conduct themselves in a professional manner while on the premises, and in accordance with Participating Entity policies and procedures, and all applicable laws.

6. PARTICIPATING ENTITY USE AND PURCHASING

A. ORDERS AND PAYMENT. To access the contracted Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract, a Participating Entity must clearly indicate to Supplier that it intends to access this Contract; however, order flow and procedure will be developed jointly between Sourcewell and Supplier. Typically, a Participating Entity will issue an order directly to Supplier or its authorized subsidiary, distributor, dealer, or reseller. If a Participating Entity issues a purchase order, it may use its own forms, but the purchase order should clearly note the applicable Sourcewell contract number. All Participating Entity orders under this Contract must be issued prior to expiration or cancellation of this Contract; however, Supplier performance, Participating Entity

payment obligations, and any applicable warranty periods or other Supplier or Participating Entity obligations may extend beyond the term of this Contract.

Supplier's acceptable forms of payment are included in its attached Proposal. Participating Entities will be solely responsible for payment and Sourcewell will have no liability for any unpaid invoice of any Participating Entity.

B. ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS/PARTICIPATING ADDENDUM. Additional terms and conditions to a purchase order, or other required transaction documentation, may be negotiated between a Participating Entity and Supplier, such as job or industry-specific requirements, legal requirements (e.g., affirmative action or immigration status requirements), or specific local policy requirements. Some Participating Entities may require the use of a Participating Addendum; the terms of which will be negotiated directly between the Participating Entity and the Supplier. Any negotiated additional terms and conditions must never be less favorable to the Participating Entity than what is contained in this Contract.

C. SPECIALIZED SERVICE REQUIREMENTS. In the event that the Participating Entity requires service or specialized performance requirements not addressed in this Contract (such as e-commerce specifications, specialized delivery requirements, or other specifications and requirements), the Participating Entity and the Supplier may enter into a separate, standalone agreement, apart from this Contract. Sourcewell, including its agents and employees, will not be made a party to a claim for breach of such agreement.

D. TERMINATION OF ORDERS. Participating Entities may terminate an order, in whole or in part, immediately upon notice to Supplier in the event of any of the following events:

 The Participating Entity fails to receive funding or appropriation from its governing body at levels sufficient to pay for the equipment, products, or services to be purchased; or
 Federal, state, or provincial laws or regulations prohibit the purchase or change the Participating Entity's requirements.

E. GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE. The governing law and venue for any action related to a Participating Entity's order will be determined by the Participating Entity making the purchase.

7. CUSTOMER SERVICE

A. PRIMARY ACCOUNT REPRESENTATIVE. Supplier will assign an Account Representative to Sourcewell for this Contract and must provide prompt notice to Sourcewell if that person is changed. The Account Representative will be responsible for:

- Maintenance and management of this Contract;
- Timely response to all Sourcewell and Participating Entity inquiries; and

• Business reviews to Sourcewell and Participating Entities, if applicable.

B. BUSINESS REVIEWS. Supplier must perform a minimum of one business review with Sourcewell per contract year. The business review will cover sales to Participating Entities, pricing and contract terms, administrative fees, sales data reports, supply issues, customer issues, and any other necessary information.

8. REPORT ON CONTRACT SALES ACTIVITY AND ADMINISTRATIVE FEE PAYMENT

A. CONTRACT SALES ACTIVITY REPORT. Each calendar quarter, Supplier must provide a contract sales activity report (Report) to the Sourcewell Supplier Development Administrator assigned to this Contract. Reports are due no later than 45 days after the end of each calendar quarter. A Report must be provided regardless of the number or amount of sales during that quarter (i.e., if there are no sales, Supplier must submit a report indicating no sales were made).

The Report must contain the following fields:

- Participating Entity Name (e.g., City of Staples Highway Department);
- Participating Entity Physical Street Address;
- Participating Entity City;
- Participating Entity State/Province;
- Participating Entity Zip/Postal Code;
- Participating Entity Contact Name;
- Participating Entity Contact Email Address;
- Participating Entity Contact Telephone Number;
- Sourcewell Assigned Entity/Participating Entity Number;
- Item Purchased Description;
- Item Purchased Price;
- Sourcewell Administrative Fee Applied; and
- Date Purchase was invoiced/sale was recognized as revenue by Supplier.

B. ADMINISTRATIVE FEE. In consideration for the support and services provided by Sourcewell, the Supplier will pay an administrative fee to Sourcewell on all Equipment, Products, and Services provided to Participating Entities. The Administrative Fee must be included in, and not added to, the pricing. Supplier may not charge Participating Entities more than the contracted price to offset the Administrative Fee.

The Supplier will submit payment to Sourcewell for the percentage of administrative fee stated in the Proposal multiplied by the total sales of all Equipment, Products, and Services purchased by Participating Entities under this Contract during each calendar quarter. Payments should note the Supplier's name and Sourcewell-assigned contract number in the memo; and must be mailed to the address above "Attn: Accounts Receivable" or remitted electronically to Sourcewell's banking institution per Sourcewell's Finance department instructions. Payments must be received no later than 45 calendar days after the end of each calendar quarter.

Supplier agrees to cooperate with Sourcewell in auditing transactions under this Contract to ensure that the administrative fee is paid on all items purchased under this Contract.

In the event the Supplier is delinquent in any undisputed administrative fees, Sourcewell reserves the right to cancel this Contract and reject any proposal submitted by the Supplier in any subsequent solicitation. In the event this Contract is cancelled by either party prior to the Contract's expiration date, the administrative fee payment will be due no more than 30 days from the cancellation date.

9. AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE

Sourcewell's Authorized Representative is its Chief Procurement Officer.

Supplier's Authorized Representative is the person named in the Supplier's Proposal. If Supplier's Authorized Representative changes at any time during this Contract, Supplier must promptly notify Sourcewell in writing.

10. AUDIT, ASSIGNMENT, AMENDMENTS, WAIVER, AND CONTRACT COMPLETE

A. AUDIT. Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 16C.05, subdivision 5, the books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices relevant to this Agreement are subject to examination by Sourcewell or the Minnesota State Auditor for a minimum of six years from the end of this Contract. This clause extends to Participating Entities as it relates to business conducted by that Participating Entity under this Contract.

B. ASSIGNMENT. Neither party may assign or otherwise transfer its rights or obligations under this Contract without the prior written consent of the other party and a fully executed assignment agreement. Such consent will not be unreasonably withheld. Any prohibited assignment will be invalid.

C. AMENDMENTS. Any amendment to this Contract must be in writing and will not be effective until it has been duly executed by the parties.

D. WAIVER. Failure by either party to take action or assert any right under this Contract will not be deemed a waiver of such right in the event of the continuation or repetition of the circumstances giving rise to such right. Any such waiver must be in writing and signed by the parties.

E. CONTRACT COMPLETE. This Contract represents the complete agreement between the parties. No other understanding regarding this Contract, whether written or oral, may be used to bind either party.For any conflict between the attached Proposal and the terms set out in Articles 1-22 of this Contract, the terms of Articles 1-22 will govern.

F. RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES. The relationship of the parties is one of independent contractors, each free to exercise judgment and discretion with regard to the conduct of their respective businesses. This Contract does not create a partnership, joint venture, or any other relationship such as master-servant, or principal-agent.

11. INDEMNITY AND HOLD HARMLESS

Supplier must indemnify, defend, save, and hold Sourcewell and its Participating Entities, including their agents and employees, harmless from any claims or causes of action, including attorneys' fees incurred by Sourcewell or its Participating Entities, arising out of any act or omission in the performance of this Contract by the Supplier or its agents or employees; this indemnification includes injury or death to person(s) or property alleged to have been caused by some defect in the Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract to the extent the Equipment, Product, or Service has been used according to its specifications. Sourcewell's responsibility will be governed by the State of Minnesota's Tort Liability Act (Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466) and other applicable law.

12. GOVERNMENT DATA PRACTICES

Supplier and Sourcewell must comply with the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes Chapter 13, as it applies to all data provided by or provided to Sourcewell under this Contract and as it applies to all data created, collected, received, stored, used, maintained, or disseminated by the Supplier under this Contract.

13. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY, PUBLICITY, MARKETING, AND ENDORSEMENT

A. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

1. *Grant of License*. During the term of this Contract:

a. Sourcewell grants to Supplier a royalty-free, worldwide, non-exclusive right and license to use thetrademark(s) provided to Supplier by Sourcewell in advertising and promotional materials for the purpose of marketing Sourcewell's relationship with Supplier.

b. Supplier grants to Sourcewell a royalty-free, worldwide, non-exclusive right and license to use Supplier's trademarks in advertising and promotional materials for the purpose of marketing Supplier's relationship with Sourcewell.

2. *Limited Right of Sublicense*. The right and license granted herein includes a limited right of each party to grant sublicenses to their respective subsidiaries, distributors, dealers, resellers, marketing representatives, and agents (collectively "Permitted Sublicensees") in

advertising and promotional materials for the purpose of marketing the Parties' relationship to Participating Entities. Any sublicense granted will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Article. Each party will be responsible for any breach of this Article by any of their respective sublicensees.

3. Use; Quality Control.

a. Neither party may alter the other party's trademarks from the form provided and must comply with removal requests as to specific uses of its trademarks or logos.

b. Each party agrees to use, and to cause its Permitted Sublicensees to use, the other party's trademarks only in good faith and in a dignified manner consistent with such party's use of the trademarks. Upon written notice to the breaching party, the breaching party has 30 days of the date of the written notice to cure the breach or the license will be terminated.

4. As applicable, Supplier agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Sourcewell and its Participating Entities against any and all suits, claims, judgments, and costs instituted or recovered against Sourcewell or Participating Entities by any person on account of the use of any Equipment or Products by Sourcewell or its Participating Entities supplied by Supplier in violation of applicable patent or copyright laws.

5. Termination. Upon the termination of this Contract for any reason, each party, including Permitted Sublicensees, will have 30 days to remove all Trademarks from signage, websites, and the like bearing the other party's name or logo (excepting Sourcewell's pre-printed catalog of suppliers which may be used until the next printing). Supplier must return all marketing and promotional materials, including signage, provided by Sourcewell, or dispose of it according to Sourcewell's written directions.

B. PUBLICITY. Any publicity regarding the subject matter of this Contract must not be released without prior written approval from the Authorized Representatives. Publicity includes notices, informational pamphlets, press releases, research, reports, signs, and similar public notices prepared by or for the Supplier individually or jointly with others, or any subcontractors, with respect to the program, publications, or services provided resulting from this Contract.

C. MARKETING. Any direct advertising, marketing, or offers with Participating Entities must be approved by Sourcewell. Send all approval requests to the Sourcewell Supplier Development Administrator assigned to this Contract.

D. ENDORSEMENT. The Supplier must not claim that Sourcewell endorses its Equipment, Products, or Services.

14. GOVERNING LAW, JURISDICTION, AND VENUE

The substantive and procedural laws of the State of Minnesota will govern this Contract. Venue for all legal proceedings arising out of this Contract, or its breach, must be in the appropriate state court in Todd County, Minnesota or federal court in Fergus Falls, Minnesota.

15. FORCE MAJEURE

Neither party to this Contract will be held responsible for delay or default caused by acts of God or other conditions that are beyond that party's reasonable control. A party defaulting under this provision must provide the other party prompt written notice of the default.

16. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Contract is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal, unenforceable, or void then both parties will be relieved from all obligations arising from that provision. If the remainder of this Contract is capable of being performed, it will not be affected by such determination or finding and must be fully performed.

17. PERFORMANCE, DEFAULT, AND REMEDIES

A. PERFORMANCE. During the term of this Contract, the parties will monitor performance and address unresolved contract issues as follows:

1. *Notification.* The parties must promptly notify each other of any known dispute and work in good faith to resolve such dispute within a reasonable period of time. If necessary, Sourcewell and the Supplier will jointly develop a short briefing document that describes the issue(s), relevant impact, and positions of both parties.

Escalation. If parties are unable to resolve the issue in a timely manner, as specified above, either Sourcewell or Supplier may escalate the resolution of the issue to a higher level of management. The Supplier will have 30 calendar days to cure an outstanding issue.
 Performance while Dispute is Pending. Notwithstanding the existence of a dispute, the Supplier must continue without delay to carry out all of its responsibilities under the Contract that are not affected by the dispute. If the Supplier fails to continue without delay to perform its responsibilities under the Contract, in the accomplishment of all undisputed work, the Supplier will bear any additional costs incurred by Sourcewell and/or its Participating Entities as a result of such failure to proceed.

B. DEFAULT AND REMEDIES. Either of the following constitutes cause to declare this Contract, or any Participating Entity order under this Contract, in default:

- 1. Nonperformance of contractual requirements, or
- 2. A material breach of any term or condition of this Contract.

The party claiming default must provide written notice of the default, with 30 calendar days to cure the default. Time allowed for cure will not diminish or eliminate any liability for liquidated or other damages. If the default remains after the opportunity for cure, the non-defaulting party may:

- Exercise any remedy provided by law or equity, or
- Terminate the Contract or any portion thereof, including any orders issued against the Contract.

18. INSURANCE

A. REQUIREMENTS. At its own expense, Supplier must maintain insurance policy(ies) in effect at all times during the performance of this Contract with insurance company(ies) licensed or authorized to do business in the State of Minnesota having an "AM BEST" rating of A- or better, with coverage and limits of insurance not less than the following:

1. *Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability.* Workers' Compensation: As required by any applicable law or regulation.

Employer's Liability Insurance: must be provided in amounts not less than listed below:

Minimum limits: \$500,000 each accident for bodily injury by accident \$500,000 policy limit for bodily injury by disease \$500,000 each employee for bodily injury by disease

2. Commercial General Liability Insurance. Supplier will maintain insurance covering its operations, with coverage on an occurrence basis, and must be subject to terms no less broad than the Insurance Services Office ("ISO") Commercial General Liability Form CG0001 (2001 or newer edition), or equivalent. At a minimum, coverage must include liability arising from premises, operations, bodily injury and property damage, independent contractors, products-completed operations including construction defect, contractual liability, blanket contractual liability, and personal injury and advertising injury. All required limits, terms and conditions of coverage must be maintained during the term of this Contract.

Minimum Limits:

\$1,000,000 each occurrence Bodily Injury and Property Damage

\$1,000,000 Personal and Advertising Injury

\$2,000,000 aggregate for Products-Completed operations

\$2,000,000 general aggregate

3. *Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance.* During the term of this Contract, Supplier will maintain insurance covering all owned, hired, and non-owned automobiles in limits of liability not less than indicated below. The coverage must be subject to terms no less broad than ISO Business Auto Coverage Form CA 0001 (2010 edition or newer), or equivalent.

Minimum Limits: \$1,000,000 each accident, combined single limit

4. *Umbrella Insurance*. During the term of this Contract, Supplier will maintain umbrella coverage over Employer's Liability, Commercial General Liability, and Commercial Automobile.

Minimum Limits: \$2,000,000

5. *Network Security and Privacy Liability Insurance*. During the term of this Contract, Supplier will maintain coverage for network security and privacy liability. The coverage may be endorsed on another form of liability coverage or written on a standalone policy. The insurance must cover claims which may arise from failure of Supplier's security resulting in, but not limited to, computer attacks, unauthorized access, disclosure of not public data – including but not limited to, confidential or private information, transmission of a computer virus, or denial of service.

Minimum limits: \$2,000,000 per occurrence \$2,000,000 annual aggregate

Failure of Supplier to maintain the required insurance will constitute a material breach entitling Sourcewell to immediately terminate this Contract for default.

B. CERTIFICATES OF INSURANCE. Prior to commencing under this Contract, Supplier must furnish to Sourcewell a certificate of insurance, as evidence of the insurance required under this Contract. Prior to expiration of the policy(ies), renewal certificates must be mailed to Sourcewell, 202 12th Street Northeast, P.O. Box 219, Staples, MN 56479 or sent to the Sourcewell Supplier Development Administrator assigned to this Contract. The certificates must be signed by a person authorized by the insurer(s) to bind coverage on their behalf.

Failure to request certificates of insurance by Sourcewell, or failure of Supplier to provide certificates of insurance, in no way limits or relieves Supplier of its duties and responsibilities in this Contract.

C. ADDITIONAL INSURED ENDORSEMENT AND PRIMARY AND NON-CONTRIBUTORY

INSURANCE CLAUSE. Supplier agrees to list Sourcewell and its Participating Entities, including their officers, agents, and employees, as an additional insured under the Supplier's commercial general liability insurance policy with respect to liability arising out of activities, "operations," or "work" performed by or on behalf of Supplier, and products and completed operations of Supplier. The policy provision(s) or endorsement(s) must further provide that coverage is

primary and not excess over or contributory with any other valid, applicable, and collectible insurance or self-insurance in force for the additional insureds.

D. WAIVER OF SUBROGATION. Supplier waives and must require (by endorsement or otherwise) all its insurers to waive subrogation rights against Sourcewell and other additional insureds for losses paid under the insurance policies required by this Contract or other insurance applicable to the Supplier or its subcontractors. The waiver must apply to all deductibles and/or self-insured retentions applicable to the required or any other insurance maintained by the Supplier or its subcontractors. Where permitted by law, Supplier must require similar written express waivers of subrogation and insurance clauses from each of its subcontractors.

E. UMBRELLA/EXCESS LIABILITY/SELF-INSURED RETENTION. The limits required by this Contract can be met by either providing a primary policy or in combination with umbrella/excess liability policy(ies), or self-insured retention.

19. COMPLIANCE

A. LAWS AND REGULATIONS. All Equipment, Products, or Services provided under this Contract must comply fully with applicable federal laws and regulations, and with the laws in the states and provinces in which the Equipment, Products, or Services are sold.

B. LICENSES. Supplier must maintain a valid and current status on all required federal, state/provincial, and local licenses, bonds, and permits required for the operation of the business that the Supplier conducts with Sourcewell and Participating Entities.

20. BANKRUPTCY, DEBARMENT, OR SUSPENSION CERTIFICATION

Supplier certifies and warrants that it is not in bankruptcy or that it has previously disclosed in writing certain information to Sourcewell related to bankruptcy actions. If at any time during this Contract Supplier declares bankruptcy, Supplier must immediately notify Sourcewell in writing.

Supplier certifies and warrants that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from programs operated by the State of Minnesota; the United States federal government or the Canadian government, as applicable; or any Participating Entity. Supplier certifies and warrants that neither it nor its principals have been convicted of a criminal offense related to the subject matter of this Contract. Supplier further warrants that it will provide immediate written notice to Sourcewell if this certification changes at any time.

21. PROVISIONS FOR NON-UNITED STATES FEDERAL ENTITY PROCUREMENTS UNDER UNITED STATES FEDERAL AWARDS OR OTHER AWARDS

Participating Entities that use United States federal grant or FEMA funds to purchase goods or services from this Contract may be subject to additional requirements including the procurement standards of the Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, 2 C.F.R. § 200. Participating Entities may have additional requirements based on specific funding source terms or conditions. Within this Article, all references to "federal" should be interpreted to mean the United States federal government. The following list only applies when a Participating Entity accesses Supplier's Equipment, Products, or Services with United States federal funds.

A. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY. Except as otherwise provided under 41 C.F.R. § 60, all contracts that meet the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" in 41 C.F.R. § 60-1.3 must include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 C.F.R. §60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, "Equal Employment Opportunity" (30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 C.F.R. §, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, "Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity," and implementing regulations at 41 C.F.R. § 60, "Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor." The equal opportunity clause is incorporated herein by reference.

B. DAVIS-BACON ACT, AS AMENDED (40 U.S.C. § 3141-3148). When required by federal program legislation, all prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by nonfederal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. § 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 5, "Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction"). In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week. The non-federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the federal awarding agency. The contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. § 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 3, "Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States"). The Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the federal awarding agency. Supplier must be in compliance with all applicable Davis-Bacon Act provisions.

C. CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT (40 U.S.C. § 3701-3708). Where applicable, all contracts awarded by the non-federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. §§ 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 5). Under 40 U.S.C. § 3702 of the Act, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. § 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence. This provision is hereby incorporated by reference into this Contract. Supplier certifies that during the term of an award for all contracts by Sourcewell resulting from this procurement process, Supplier must comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

D. RIGHTS TO INVENTIONS MADE UNDER A CONTRACT OR AGREEMENT. If the federal award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) and the recipient or subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the recipient or subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 C.F.R. § 401, "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency. Supplier certifies that during the term of an award for all contracts by Sourcewell resulting from this procurement process, Supplier must comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

E. CLEAN AIR ACT (42 U.S.C. § 7401-7671Q.) AND THE FEDERAL WATER POLLUTION CONTROL ACT (33 U.S.C. § 1251-1387). Contracts and subgrants of amounts in excess of \$150,000 require the non-federal award to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. § 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to the Federal awarding agency and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Rosenbauer then ensures that the pricing is in line with the Sourcewell contract parameters before returning it to the dealer. The dealer will then take the proposal with drawing and price back to the customer for final approval. The customer will write a purchase order to one of the Rosenbauer America facilities (Rosenbauer South Dakota, LLC or Rosenbauer Minesota, LLC) or to one of our authorized dealers. Our dealer then submits the original purchase order and cost analysis sheet to the appropriate facility. Once submitted, the purchase order is reviewed for accuracy and completeness and a thank you letter is sent to the purchasing department. The dealer will submit the following documents to Rosenbauer: full specifications for the purchased product, signed engineering drawings, original purchase order from customer or a purchase order from the dealer to Rosenbauer if the dealer will hold the contract. Regardless of whom accepts the purchase order (Rosenbauer or it's dealer) Rosenbauer is responsible for all reporting of contract purchases to Sourcewell and Rosenbauer is responsible to pay all fees for associated purchases on our Sourcewell contract.

Except as amended by this Amendment, the Contract remains in full force and effect.

Madam Mayor and Members of City Council,

Background

The resignation of Mike McGuinnness as DDA Director in February of this year left a vacancy in the position that has been filled temporarily by Jennifer Finney, Interim Director. We have been incredibly lucky to have to Jennifer during this time of transition, as she has brought stability, experience, and a and institutional knowledge to the role. During her short time, she has helped the Board navigate a number of things including the next fiscal year budget. The DDA Organizational Committee, with the help of the City's Human Resources Director, Jessica Stover, lead a search for the next director that started in January of this year. Interviews were conducted, and a selection was made. While the selection was made earlier this year, the applicant was not available until August, so the contract approval was put on hold until this month.

Summary

I am happy to finally announce the Organizational Committee chose to recommend Nate Mack as our next Director. We brought the recommended contract to the DDA Board on July 9th, and it was approved unanimously. Nate comes to us most recently from the city of South Lyon, where has served as the DDA Executive Director and Economic Development Director for the last five years. Prior that, Nate served as the Development Coordinator for the Michigan Theatre of Jackson, and the Executive Director for the Jackson DDA. Nate is a Certified Farmers' Market Manager, holds a Professional Downtown Management Certificate, and sits on several boards and committees including the Michigan Downtown Association Board of Directors. With a wealth of experience and knowledge, I'm excited to see what Nate has to bring to this role.

While the Downtown Development Authority Director is overseen by the DDA Board, and they are responsible for carrying out the goals of the Board, the position is employed by the City and operates as part of the Merit System. The DDA budget reimburses the City's General Fund for all the costs associated with the position's employment.

Recommendation

Motion to approve the employment contract for the Downtown Development Authority Director.

Employment Contract

This Employment Contract (the "Agreement") is made and entered into as of August 18, 2025 by and between the City of Berkley ("Employer") and Nathan Mack ("Employee").

1. Position and Responsibilities

The Employer agrees to employ the Employee in the position of DDA Executive Director. The Employee agrees to perform the duties and responsibilities set forth in the job description, which may be amended by the majority vote of the DDA Board, and to comply with all policies and procedures established by the Employer.

2. Term of Employment

The term of this employment shall begin on August 18, 2025. The Employee's regular schedule will be Monday-Friday with flex time offered for covering special events to be used within the same payroll cycle with approval from the City Manager. The employee will reasonably endeavor to have office hours at City Hall during standard business hours between 8:30AM-5:00PM.

3. Compensation

The Employee will be paid an annual salary of \$85,000, payable in accordance with the Employer's standard payroll practices. This is a permanent, full-time position. The Employee shall be entitled to benefits in accordance with the policies and provisions governing the Merit Employee Group.

4. Duties and Obligations

The Employee agrees to perform the duties and responsibilities of the position as set forth in the job description, in a timely, efficient, and professional manner. The Employee shall also:

- Report to the City Manager
- Attend all relevant meetings as required by the Employer.
- Comply with all applicable laws, policies, and regulations.

5. Confidentiality

The Employee agrees to maintain the confidentiality of all proprietary and sensitive information belonging to the Employer, and shall not disclose such information to any third parties without prior written consent, both during and after the term of employment.

Any documents, records, recordings, or other information acquired or prepared by the Employee in the course of performing services for the Employer will remain the property of the Employer and must not be destroyed, discarded, reproduced or distributed without the Employer's consent. Upon termination, the Employee must return and turnover to the Employer any property, documents and records that belong to the Employer.

6. Termination

This position shall be at-will and may be terminated at any time by the Employee, by the City, or by a majority vote of the DDA Board with or without cause. In the event the Employee elects to terminate this position they shall provide at least a two-week advance notice to the City. The City may chose to voluntarily waive this requirement.

7. Entire Agreement

This Agreement contains the entire understanding between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes any prior or contemporaneous oral or written agreements or understandings related to the Employee's employment with the Employer. Any amendments to this Agreement must be in writing and signed by both parties.

8. Miscellaneous

- If a dispute arises concerning this Agreement or Employee's employment with the Employer, such dispute can be resolved only through binding arbitration pursuant to the terms of this arbitration provision. Within one hundred eighty (180) days of the event or occurrence which gives rise to the dispute, either Employee or the Employer may file a demand for arbitration with the American Arbitration Association ("AAA"). Such arbitration shall be conducted in accordance with AAA's employment arbitration rules (except as modified herein). Such arbitration shall be heard by a single Michigan arbitrator. The determination of the arbitrator shall be binding upon both the Employer and Employee. All expenses, costs, administrative filing fees and arbitrator's fees shall be shared equally by the Employer and Employee. The parties further agree that they will comply with the terms of this arbitration provision and any award rendered by the arbitrator, and that a judgment of a court having jurisdiction may be entered upon the award as long as the arbitrator does not exceed their authority or jurisdiction. This arbitration agreement specifically includes, but is not limited to, statutory claims of employment discrimination.
- **Indemnification**: The Employer and Employee mutually agree to hold harmless and indemnify each other and their members, officials, officers, directors, boards and commissions, and employees from and against any and all claims, liabilities, loss, costs and expenses (including, without limitation, reasonable attorney's fees and costs of litigation) relating to any alleged error or omission in connection with the performance of, or failure to perform, services under this contractual arrangement, including without limitation, any fines or penalties imposed by any state or federal government agency, unless it is determined that such claim, liability, cost or expense was caused by the Employee's bad faith, negligence, nonfeasance, misfeasance, malfeasance or willful misconduct. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to waive or negate any governmental immunity defense from tort liability that may apply to the City.

BPSOA Tentative Agreement

Madam Mayor and Members of City Council,

Background

Subject:

We have been in negotiations over a new contract for several months now, as the existing contract expired June 30, 2025. Through the guidance of our labor attorney, Brandon Fournier, we have come to a tentative agreement with BPSOA (Berkley Patrol Officers) union representation that has been approved by their membership

Summary

I'm proud of both the union representation and the City's team, which included Deputy City Manager of Public Services Shawn Young, Human Resources Director Jessica Stover along with myself. I believe both sides took a thoughtful approach that balanced our fiscal responsibilities and restrictions, as well as a fair benefit package to employees that will keep us competitive throughout the recruitment and retainment of employees. The specifics of the agreement can be found in the tentative agreement, but the highlights are as follows:

- 3-year contract
- Wage increases:
 - Year 1 (2025) 3% with \$1,000 signing bonus (increase will be retroactively applied to July 1, 2025)
 - Year 2 (2026) 4% increase
 - Year 3 (2027) 4% increase
- Employee Healthcare Premium Sharing:
 - \$25/month single coverage
 - o \$50/month two-person coverage
 - o \$100/month family coverage
- Increase to the earned rate of sick time to 10 hours a month
- A shift premium to those assigned to midnight shift at a rate of 2%
- The increase in the accumulation of compensatory time from 200 to 300 hours a year

Further, I am recommending we continue the past practice of carrying the wage and healthcare terms of the MAPE contract to MERIT employees.

- 8. All POLC references in the Collective Bargaining Agreement shall be updated to the Michigan Association of Police (MAP).
- 9. The parties agree that they shall update the Collective Bargaining Agreement's format subject to approval of both parties and the agreement to delete obsolete language.
- 10. Sick Time.

Sick time shall be earned at a rate of ten (10) hours per month.

11. Shift Premium.

Shift premium will be paid for bargaining unit members assigned to midnight shift for their normal shift and overtime worked at a rate of 2% percent base hourly rate.

12. Comp Time.

An employee may accumulate up to 300 hours of overtime as compensatory time. This shall be limited to 300 hours in any single calendar year.

- 13. In the event a PSO spot is open on a shift due to a sick call, vacation, training, the lowest senior PSO will be ordered at a rate of two (2) times per pay.
- 14. Long-Term Disability.

Similar to the language in the agreement between Local Union No. 121 and the City of Berkley (Section 12.14). Employees shall receive long-term disability (LTD) coverage at the City's expense. After the expiration of a 90-day elimination period, the LTD benefit shall pay a totally disabled eligible employee 60% of his or her base monthly earnings. Additional definitions, terms and conditions shall be provided in the coverage document for the specific LTD program selected by the City.

A totally disabled employee receiving LTD benefit payments shall continue to receive the health and welfare benefits described in Section 1501 but shall not be credited with any additions to the paid leave times. If an employee retires and continues to receive a full or reduced LTD benefit, the employee shall receive health and welfare benefits to retired employees as described in Section 1702. An employee who works and receives partial disability LTD payments shall receive such benefits as would normally accrue to an able-bodied person doing the same work with the same work schedule.

15. USERRA (Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act) – protects individuals from employment discrimination due to their military service. It ensures that service members can return to their civilian jobs after military service and are not disadvantaged due to their service.

Proposed Contract Language – Employees that are in the "Uniformed Services" shall not lose seniority rights or benefits due to:

1. Duration: 3 years

July 1, 2025 – June 30, 2028

2. Wages:

July 1, 2025: 3%. This shall be subject to retroactive payment.

The City shall issue payment of a one-time signing bonus of \$1,000.00 upon ratification.

July 1, 2026: 4%

July 1, 2027: 4%

3. Article XV: Insurance

07-02-2025 The Employee Premium Sharing will be \$25.00 for a single person, \$50.00 for two-person coverage and \$100.00 for family coverage per month.

4. Twelve (12) hour shifts:

All classifications (detective/patrol) shall be assigned 84 hour work week. The City agrees to incorporate the twelve (12) hour shift schedule into the collective bargaining agreement. Effective each December a bargaining unit member shall select to receive the E/L time as pay or compensatory time. In the event the member selects to receive the 104 hours as compensatory time twenty-four (24) hours shall be treated as personal time, with one (1) as an EPL Day. The remaining eighty (80) hours shall be subject to compensatory time rules including the annual accrual limit.

6. ACT 345 PENSIONS:

Up to 800 hours of any accumulated time shall be included in final FAC. This shall include sick, vacation, personal, compensatory time or other.

7. 1204: BUY-BACK AT SEPARATION OF DEATH

1701.25: Average Final Compensation for vested bargaining unit members shall include base wage at the applicable wage rate to a maximum of 2,184 hours per year, for the three highest consecutive years . Holiday buyback and sick leave buyback paid within the three highest consecutive years of earnings. Officer in pay charge actually paid within the three highest consecutive years or earnings. Up to 1,068 hours of any accumulated time paid shall be included in final AFC. This shall include, sick, vacation, compensatory time and holiday time.

All values are added together in one calculator and then dived by three (3) years to determine Average Final Compensation.

Madam Mayor and Members of City Council,

Background

We have been in negotiations over a new contract for several months now, as the existing contract expired June 30, 2025. Through the guidance of our labor attorney, Brandon Fournier, we have come to a tentative agreement with MAPE union representation that has been approved by their membership

Summary

I'm proud of both the union representation and the City's team, which included Deputy City Manager of Public Services Shawn Young, Human Resources Director Jessica Stover along with myself. I believe both sides took a thoughtful approach that balanced our fiscal responsibilities and restrictions, as well as a fair benefit package to employees that will keep us competitive throughout the recruitment and retainment of employees. The specifics of the agreement can be found in the tentative agreement, but the highlights are as follows:

- 3-year contract
- Wage increases:
 - Year 1 (2025) 3% with \$1,000 signing bonus (increase will be retroactively applied to July 1, 2025)
 - Year 2 (2026) 4% increase
 - Year 3 (2027) 4% increase
- Employee Healthcare Premium Sharing:
 - o \$25/month single coverage
 - \$50/month two-person coverage
 - \$100/month family coverage
- Increases to water license stipends
- Addition of Pesticide Certification and Playground Certification

Further, I am recommending we continue the past practice of carrying the wage and healthcare terms of the MAPE contract to MERIT employees.

- 1. Duration: Three-year contract, July 1, 2025 June 30, 2028
- 2. Article 5, Check Off of Membership Dues/Employee Authorization, Revocation.
 - A. Section 5.3: Delete: During my membership in the Union, an amount established by the Union as monthly...
 - B. Delete second paragraph, rewrite: "Membership in the Union is not a mandatory condition of employment. Members may opt out of the Union by providing written notification to the Union on forms provided by the Union."
- 3. Article 6, Grievance Procedure.
 - A. Section 6.5 & 6.6: Increase number of days to file and respond to a grievance to ten (10) working days.
 - B. Section 6.11: Increase number of days to file for arbitration to thirty (30) days.
- 4. Cost of Prescription safety glasses shall be provided by the City. Up to a maximum of \$200 every two (2) years with eligible receipts. If the glasses are damaged in the course of their work the city may replace them at their discretion.
- 5. Wages. The City proposes:

Year 1: 2025, 3%:

Signing bonus of \$1,000.00

Year 2: 2026, 4% Year 3: 2027, 4%

6. Article 12, Sick Leave.

Section 12.1: Accumulation. Increase from seven (7) hours per month to eight (8) hours per month, equal to merit.

- 7. Annual Leave modified to match Merit System. Vacation may be taken at accrual before the 6 month anniversary.
- 8. Insurance:

7-2-2025: The employee premium sharing will be \$25.00 for a single person, \$50.00 for the two person coverage and \$100.00 for family coverage per month. The City agrees to opt out of PA 152 of 2011 during the duration of the collective bargaining agreement.

- 9. Delete Section 11.2 And 11.3. Vacation shall match merit system.
- 10. Article 12: Sick leave

Increase accrual to eight (8) hours per month.

Delete: 12.2

Delete: 12.10

Delete: 12.13

11. Disability Insurance:

Include plan to match Merit Group.

- 12. The City and the Union agree to incorporate the LOA for promotions into the successor collective bargaining agreement.
- 13. Article 17 Uniforms:

\$550 per year for boots and foul weather gear. The City shall provide the daily uniform.

14. Article 18 Breaks:

The City shall provide a lunch period not a paid for meal. Except for unscheduled overtime greater than four (4) hours. Not to exceed \$19.00 per person.

15. Article 16:

16.4 & 16.5: increase license pay by one hundred dollars (\$100.00).16.5: \$400.00 per year stipend for: Pesticide certification and playground certification.

16. Compensatory time:

Any accrued Compensatory time will be paid to a bargaining unit members at separation of employment.
