VI. Oakland County Commissioner Charlie Cavell

- A. General Fund Budget (money comes from taxes)
 - 1. Office of Sustainability created 3 new positions
 - a. 1 person working on internal sustainability
 - i. Working to make county carbon neutral by 2040
 - b. 2 people working on external sustainability
 - Spreading information to local municipalities
 - 2. Agreement with Oakland University to the be research arm of the Office of Sustainability
- B. American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA): COVID-19 relief money. Originally \$244M, there is \$118M left in the fund.
 - 1. Water quality / stormwater
 - a. Local community grants and infrastructure
 - b. Basement flooding prevention, etc.
 - c. Water Resource Commissioner applying for state funds
 - 2. New ideas: Michigan Saves Program
 - a. \$5M used as \$10K loan or grant to Oakland County Homeowners for weatherization. Trying to get this moved through before the November election
 - b. Timeline:
 - i. ASAP: county executive leadership to determine if the funds will be a grant or a loan
 - ii. ~3 weeks: proposal to go through the County Commission
 - iii. Mid-September: proposal to go through Public Health and Safety
 - iv. October: Board meeting to vote on initiative
 - c. Green Tri-Party agreement could be set up for environmental projects, where the city, non-profit, or businesses contribute funds, along with the county and the Water Resource Commission
 - 3. Transit
 - a. Opt-Out: currently, regional initiatives for transit depend on voluntary participation.
 - i. Some communities do not support transit initiatives
 - ii. On the ballot for November is a proposal to eliminate the option of opting out
 - iii. Charlie Cavell suggested making and distributing informative flyers, notices on social media, about this initiative
 - a. Mark Richardson will put this info on the BEAC Facebook page
 - iv. Proposal for a 10-year millage (instead of usual 4-year timeline) for SMART and local transit systems.
